

FINAL TOUCHES FOR D. O. K. K. CEREMONY AT ETNA MILLS

The final touches have been placed on arrangements for the D. O. K. FIRST REPORTER AT JOHNSTOWN FLOOD CALLED BY DEATH

LOS ANGELES, May 4.—M. F. Ihmsen, publisher of the Los Angeles Examiner, died at his home here today after an illness of nearly two years. He is survived by a widow and daughter.

Mr. Ihmsen was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., March 14, 1863. After attending schools in Stuttgart, Germany and Allentown, Pa., he was graduated from the Pittsburgh Catholic college in 1886. Two years later he entered the newspaper field as a reporter for the Pittsburgh Post. In 1898, as a reporter for the Pittsburgh Post, he was assigned to the Johnstown flood disaster and was the first newspaperman to reach the dam above South Fork, Pa., the breaking of which caused the catastrophe.

Later, Mr. Ihmsen joined the staff of the New York Herald. When the New York Journal was purchased by William Randolph Hearst in 1895, Mr. Ihmsen joined the staff as Albany correspondent. The following year he was made city editor. He became its political editor in 1898 and its Washington correspondent in 1900.

About this time Mr. Ihmsen began to take an active part in politics, starting as secretary of the National association of Democratic Clubs in 1900, a position he held until 1904. He was a member of the executive committee of the democratic national congressional committee in 1902 and 1904 was active in the campaign to obtain the democratic presidential nomination for Mr. Hearst.

In 1905 he organized the Municipal Ownership league in New York, which nominated Mr. Hearst for mayor the same year.

Mr. Ihmsen became publisher of the Examiner in 1908.

AMERICA MAY AID UNTANGLING ISSUES

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Possibility that the influence of the United States in reparations settlements with Germany had not ended with the dispatch of Monday night's communication returning the counter proposals to Berlin was seen today in the invitation of the allied supreme council to have American representatives among its members as well as on the reparations commission and council of ambassadors.

An official statement of the American position is expected when the invitation is formally received here.

NO PEACE NEAR IN SHIPPING STRIKE

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Prospects for an immediate settlement of the shipping wage controversy were said to be anything but bright after a conference today between Secretaries Hoover and Davis and representatives of the shipping board and steamship owners. Mr. Davis, however, had not given up hope and arranged to meet later in the day with spokesmen for the unions.

THREATEN BOYCOTT OF BUENOS AIRES DISCRIMINATION

BUENOS AIRES, May 4.—Hope for the speedy release of the Munson liner Martha Washington, which has been tied up here by a boycott of dock workers for a month, dwindled last night, when it became known that two proffered solutions of the question had been disapproved by authorities at the state department at Washington.

One proposal was suggested by European steamship lines and would have brought about joint action between them and the United States shipping board, owner of the Martha Washington, in threatening to boycott the port of Buenos Aires unless the Argentine government took some action to relieve steamers from altogether unwarranted impositions by the port worker's union.

The other offer was made to the Munson line by the Buenos Aires Labor Protective association, an important organization of employers, which proposed to supply non-union labor which, under armed protection, would unload the boycotted steamship.

CONFAB ATTACHES, DATA MASS ARRIVE

LONDON, May 4.—Fifty persons making up the staff of the allied reparations commission, accompanied by members of that body here from Paris. The commission brought large quantities of records and documents which will be used in its conference with the supreme allied council.

The commission met financial experts of various governments this forenoon and examined plans agreed upon by the council yesterday relative to the payment of reparations by Germany and the issuance of bonds.

Marshal Foch and Admiral Gras, commanders, respectively, of the military and naval forces of France, left for Paris this morning.

An invitation has been sent to Washington inviting the United States government to appoint a representative who will act as a member of the supreme council.

SINN FEIN OPENS SCOTTISH CAMPAIGN

GLASGOW, Scotland, May 4.—A police inspector was shot dead and a detective wounded here this morning in what is believed to have been the first Sinn Fein attack on the police in Scotland. The Sinn Feiners fired on policemen who were escorting a van conveying a man to prison, killing the inspector and wounding the detective. The assailants escaped.

OREGON FRUIT TO KNOW GOOD SALES SURVEY SHOWS

WASHINGTON, May 4.—There will be tremendous demand for the tree fruits of Oregon this year because of the crop failure in other parts of the United States. Senator McNary today confirmed reports that the crops in Oregon of apples, peaches and other tree fruits are heavily set and the yield in the great Rogue river, Hood river and Willamette valleys will be at or above normal.

In a few days the bureau of market estimates of the agricultural department will issue a survey of the tree fruit crop of the country and will report that generally but half a crop may be expected. It will show that in the plains states as far west as the Rocky mountains there has been great damage to tree crops and that in the states of New England, Atlantic coast and Great Lakes the crop has been badly injured.

The total appraisal of the country by the bureau of markets will be half a crop for the fruits which Oregon will produce so bountifully.

POLAND WARNED TO KEEP COOL OVER LOSS OF SILESIA

PARIS, May 4.—(By the Associated Press)—The French government, it was learned today, has strongly impressed upon the government at Warsaw the grave consequences to Polish interests likely to result from a Polish uprising in upper Silesia. Unrest has been reported in this region over the rumor of an allied decision giving Poland only two districts there as a result of the recent plebiscite. A mining strike also is in progress there.

Serious rioting is reported to have occurred in some sections and French troops of occupation have had clashes with bands of Polish insurgents. The insurgents' activities yesterday took the form of cutting communications with Germany, bridges between Hoeslau and the Silesian mining regions being blown up.

French infantry, with tanks have succeeded in clearing Beuthen and Baumort of rioters, but the utmost apprehension exists here as to the development of the movement.
