REDUCE BANK RATE TO HANDLE CROPS

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Action of the New York Federal reserve bank in reducing its re-discount rate from 7 to 6 1/2 per cent reflects a tendency towards relaxation in re-discount rates in other reserve districts, Secretary Mellon said today. He said he thought it probable the Chicago reserve board might anticipate the crop movement season with a rate reduction.

PORTLAND EMPLOYERS GIVE WORKERS TERMS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5.—The Building Construction Employers' association announced today that it would allow its various groups of employers to sign agreements with the unions. Strike of the painters, sheet metal workers' and electrical workers' unions was called as a result of failure of the contractors to take steps toward formation of some sort of agreement simultaneously with the cut of 10 per cent in wages as recommended by a board of arbitration.
