MORAL COWARD IF PREACHERS' PAY CUT, SAYS BULGIN

Thursday night at the Bulgin-Lewis meeting was somewhat interfered with by the rain, but in no way affected the message of the evening, or the interest of the good crowd out. It was M. E. Church, South and Free Methodist night, and the churches turned out in good numbers. A solo was well rendered by one of their number. Banners were carried as has been the custom each night by the visiting churches. This afternoon the Singsine chorus held a meeting. These meetings of the boys and girls are drawing several hundred of our boys and girls and are of a nature to instruct and interest them. They are in charge of Mr. Lewis.

Dr. Bulgin spoke last evening on "The Great Doctrines of the Bible." Among other things said are the following:

"No man has a right to think for himself, unless he thinks right."

"When men get to thinking wrong they act wrong."

"Get a false theory and you get a false life."

"What we need in America is an old fashioned revival of the old teachings of the bible."

"Repentance is a change of mind toward God."

"Man is the only animal that reasons about immortality."

"You have no right to live that kind of life that there is any doubt about your future when you come to die."

"There are six men in the bible who said 'I have sinned,' and it did not mean a hill of beans."

"You are a moral coward if you cut off the preacher's salary, because he has said something to offend you."

"Some of you are like the woman who said she never told her secrets but to two classes of persons; those who ask me, and those who do not."

"Your church buildings are a disgrace to the community."

"Conversion is right about face. It is the sinner's act, while regeneration is God's act."

"You can only get life by antecedent life."

"You have a lot of people in the church, who have turned about face, but have not been regenerated."

"Until there is a difference between the man in the church and the man outside religion is a failure."

"There is a world of difference between sanctification and crankification."

"Tonight is Presbyterian church night. The Presbyterians from Phoenix are to attend with the church at Medford. Dr. Bulgin will speak on 'The Parable of the Penny, or Motive, God's Measure of Value.'"

Beginning next Sunday there will be an afternoon meeting at 2:30 p. m. as well as an evening meeting.
