NOTHING COUNTS BUT CALIFORNIA VIEW, SAYS HIRAM

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 6.—The Japanese problem is a national one and is not local, says a statement issued at Washington today by Senator Hiram Johnson of California, concerning the origin of the new congressional executive committee composed of western state representatives and senators and of which Senator Johnson is chairman. The statement is carried in a dispatch to the Sacramento Bee. "The purpose of the committee," said the statement, "is to endeavor to present the western viewpoint on the Japanese immigration and land ownership question, not only to congress but generally. It has been organized, not for the purpose of embarrassing the administration, but rather for the purpose of aiding it. "We hope to be of real service to the state department in enabling it to become acquainted with the facts, with which we have become familiar in the west."
