The Southern Pacific railroad in its latest report has the following to say of the Rogie River valley outlook: "Nearly all of the available acreage of cultivated land in the Rogie River valley has now been planted. There was not as much grain sown as usual, which was on account of the heavy rains last fall, ground being too wet to work. Considerable amount of acreage that had formerly been sown to grain has now been planted to alfalfa. Since last September there has been 22 inches rainfall. This is 8 inches above normal of past few years. Ground is full of moisture, sufficient to mature the crops without any more rain. Apples and pears are doing well. There have been four frosts, lowest temperature being 25 1/2 degrees. There has been some damage to some of the orchards, due to frost, but taking it as a whole, prospects are for a heavy crop this year. Weather for the past few weeks cloudy and rather cool. This is not good growing weather for the Rogie River valley, but while it does not grow anything it keeps away the frosts, and farmers and orchardists are well pleased with the conditions."

The Film Forum

Conducted by Eleanor Dale

I cannot advise you to take up writing motion picture stories as a profession before you have sold one story. You might not thank me for the advice in a month or so. But certainly I do not discourage writing stories in your spare time and submitting them.

The urge to write is nothing new, and it is never a sure sign of literary talent. Everyone at some time or other feels the desire for self expression. It may come out in acting, in painting or in playing the piano, but because the tools of the writer are always at hand it most often results in maiden efforts of poems, short stories, novels or plays.

Language seems easy to handle, because it is a medium familiar to everyone, but to shape it in the form of a good story or play generally requires special tools in hands that are expert through long training. Embryo poets and authors, with no knowledge of prosody or story construction, get back enough rejection slips to paper a room and then give up trying. The mechanics of a play are something not easily mastered by a novice. The novel is long and tedious work, with a technique of its own.

The screen story, on the other hand, though it demands just as much originality and careful thought as the play or novel, calls for no special knowledge of any literary craft. Provided you have a good original idea, that can be expanded into a logical and interesting screen story, you can write the synopsis of a scenario, and a synopsis is all it is necessary to submit. By a logical story I mean one that does not make villains die of heart failure just as they are about to kill the hero or bad men suddenly reform into saints for the purposes of the plot, and an interesting story is one with a central idea, strong enough to hold the attention of a general audience rather than one made up from

I. W. W. CHIEFS IN JAIL AND RUSSIA, COMRADES MEET

CHICAGO, May 9.—Absolute harmony and peaceful discussion of plans to educate workers in scientific economics in a world "economic international" and in industrial management against "the proper time" when they would take control, pervaded the sessions of the thirteenth annual convention of the Industrial Workers of the World which opened today.

With a number of their leaders and individual members in Leavenworth prison serving sentences for violation of the wartime espionage act and their former chief, William D. (Big Bill) Haywood, reported to be in Russia holding an official propaganda position with the soviet government, the I. W. W. faced a hard task. Roy Brown, chairman of the executive board, said. Amnesty for its imprisoned members was said to be one of the major issues before the convention.

The "economic international" it was explained, would be entirely non-political and concerned only with the organization of the world's workers along economic lines.
