

CARETAKER PUT IN CHARGE OF AUTO GROUNDS

Medford is not only furnishing a good city auto camp ground this year to tourists, but is now furnishing a caretaker whose duty is not only to preserve order and keep the grounds clean, but act as a bureau of information to the visiting tourists.

It is also one of his duties to keep a register containing the names of each tourist party, their home address, where they are enroute to, and the make and number of their car.

The caretaker, William Davis, well known veteran citizen of Medford who has been appointed by the city council at a salary of \$50 a month went on duty this morning. No better selection could have been made in the general opinion. The city council also voted recently to furnish firewood to the auto campers at cost, and Caretaker Davis also has charge of the sale of firewood.

WILSON PROMISED ARMY AND NAVY TO SMALL LANDS

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Senator Spencer, republican, Missouri revived today in an address to the senate the controversy he had with President Wilson last October during the presidential campaign concerning what Mr. Wilson had said at a plenary session of the peace conference May 31, 1919. The controversy revolved around an alleged declaration by Mr. Wilson that if the territorial integrity of Rumania and Serbia should be threatened American forces would be sent overseas to assist them.

Recalling that Mr. Wilson had denied having made such a statement and also had said he did not have a transcript of his remarks, Senator Spencer presented the full text of Mr. Wilson's address which he obtained last month from the state department and which Secretary Hughes wrote him had been received at the department from Paris in July 1919.

From this text Senator Spencer read the following quotation:

"We must not close our eyes to the fact that in the last analysis the military and naval strength of the great powers will be the final guaranty of the peace of the world. * * * There underlies all these transactions the expectation on the part, for example, of Rumania and Czechoslovakia and of Serbia, that if any covenants of this settlement are not observed the United States will send her armies and her navies to see that they are observed."

Senator Spencer said he would make no comment on what this record showed, adding that it spoke for itself with convincing force.

Referring to the final statement on the subject by President Wilson that he was "perfectly willing to leave it to the voters of Missouri to determine which of us is telling the truth," Senator Spencer said he might be pardoned for recalling that at the election on last November 3 his majority over his democratic opponent was 121,663.

Will She Aid Mother or Father?

LONDON WELCOMES HIROHITO, GUEST ROYAL FAMILY

LONDON, May 9.—The capital of the British empire today accorded Prince Hirohito, heir to the Japanese throne, a tumultuous welcome upon his arrival here for a three weeks visit to England. Full honors of state were extended to him, the occasion being the first for such honors to a visiting foreign dignitary since 1914. A bright spring day provided ideal weather for the function.

The Japanese prince, accompanied by the Prince of Wales, arrived at Victoria station on a special train from Portsmouth. He was greeted with cordial handshakes by King George, the Duke of Connaught and the Duke of York. The brilliant suite of British officialdom in attendance stood at attention while the bands played the Japanese anthem.

Then, at the side of the king, in a state carriage the crown prince was driven off, through streets cordoned by troops and lined with cheering multitudes, to Buckingham palace.

LONDON, May 9.—Crown Prince Hirohito of Japan today began a three weeks visit to England under most auspicious circumstances. He landed in Portsmouth harbor this morning from the battleship Katori, being escorted to the shore by the Prince of Wales, British warships in the harbor (thundering the royal salute when he left the dock of the battleship).

The prince proceeded to Buckingham palace, where he will be the guest of King George and Queen Mary for several days. Announcement has been made that the crown prince has been made an honorary general of the British army.

The prince probably will leave for France about June 1.

SCORES HURT IN ROCHESTER RIOT

ROCHESTER, N. Y., May 9.—Quelling a riot of 400 striking laborers and sympathizers here today, several policemen were severely bruised, two rioters seriously shot and 50 others, both men and women, stunned and mutilated by riot sticks.

It was the most serious outbreak of the building trades strike, which started here April 1.

SICK CONGRESSMAN CUT HIS THROAT

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., May 9.—Congressman William S. Frankhauser of the third Michigan district committed suicide in a sanitarium here today by cutting his throat with a razor. He was found in a bath tub by his attendant some time after slashing his throat. Despondency over ill health is believed to have prompted the act.

ATTEMPT TO DYNAMITE MEXICAN PRIZEFIGHT

MEXICALI, Lower California, May 9.—Mexican authorities today made 14 arrests in connection with the finding of six sticks of dynamite Sunday in a building in which a prize fight was in progress. The prisoners were placed in the court.

WHOLESALE KILLING BY REDS REPORTED

STOCKHOLM, May 9.—Reports of wholesale executions by the bolsheviks of participants in the recent Kronstadt uprising are contained in a private message from Helsingfors to the Tidningen today. These met with immediate denial, however, from the bolshevik agency here. The message asserted that several thousands of the Kronstadt rebels, among them hundreds of women and children had been executed, but the soviet agency says that only thirteen persons, leaders of the revolt, were shot.

FIRE AT WILLAMETTE 'U' COSTS \$10,000

SALEM, Ore., May 9.—Fire this morning destroyed the gymnasium building at Willamette university. It was a frame building which, with equipment, made a loss of about \$10,000. The cause of the fire is believed to have been defective wiring. Nearly all the football, baseball and other athletic paraphernalia was lost. R. L. Mathews, athletic director, said today however, that the spring games and track meets would be played as scheduled.

PORTLAND TO RUSH ALASKAN AID

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9.—Taking cognizance of an appeal from Juneau, Alaska last week to the Portland Chamber of Commerce for relief from shortages of supplies caused by the marine strike, representatives of the striking organizations here at a meeting today took action offering to furnish men free of charge to serve on boats to Alaska to relieve distress if ship owners would donate the use of their ships.

FIND CLUE TO LONG MISSING NAVAL TUG

HONOLULU, May 9.—Navy vessels searching for the missing navy tug Conestoga, which was last seen buffeting a gale April 8, en route from San Diego to Guam, are today following up a report that the tank steamer Frank H. Buck reported an unidentified spar floating 300 miles north-west of Honolulu.

WOMEN TO BUILD CAPITOL QUARTERS

NEW YORK, May 9.—The Women's National Civic Foundation project to provide in Washington joint headquarters for all national women's organizations was the subject of discussion at a meeting of the foundation today. Miss Alice Carpenter, the foundation's secretary, said a ten acre estate at the head of Connecticut avenue in Washington has been acquired, where it is proposed to construct a group of artistic buildings and club houses, one residence for each organization. The ground are to be beautified and among other features a large theater is to be erected.

FAT GRAFT PAID TO HALT SHOW STRIKE

CHICAGO, May 9.—Labor leaders were paid \$43,000 to stop or prevent labor troubles during the construction of the State-Lake vaudeville theater in 317-13, George Trude, former municipal judge today told the legislative committee investigating an alleged building trust here. Trude was secretary of a local company building the theater and said he paid the money under orders from Mort Sinner of New York, general manager of a vaudeville circuit, which was interested in the theater.

ABANDON 60 FORTS THROUGHOUT LAND

WASHINGTON, May 9.—More than sixty obsolete forts and military posts of no further military value, have been recommended to congress by Secretary Weeks for abandonment. Many of them are intimately identified with the early history of the country. The list includes the following:

In Washington—Fort Townsend, Three Tree Point and Vashon Island.

GREEKS REPORT ALL WELL IN SMYRA

ATHENS, May 9.—Military conditions in the Smyrna district of Asia Minor are highly satisfactory and the morale of the Greek army there is good. Premier Gounaris told King Constantine and the cabinet yesterday. The premier returned last week from Smyrna.

OGDEN COP KILLED INTERRUPTED YEGGS

OGDEN, Utah, May 9.—Charles Manzell, Ogden patrolman, on his first shift after a leave of absence for war work, was shot to death by bandits today when he came upon them robbing a clothing store.

DE FACTO RECOGNITION OF RUSSIA CLAIMED

COPENHAGEN, May 9.—(By the Associated Press)—The British government, it is asserted in information obtained here from a Russian source, has given de facto recognition to the Russian soviet government. (No confirmation of this report has been received from any other source).
