"The condition of Jacksonville's fire fighting apparatus, as shown by the state fire marshal's report, an extract from which appears on the first page of this paper, gives the average citizen food for thought," says the Jacksonville Jost. "Plainly speaking, at the present moment we have absolutely no means of combatting a fire. The report explicitly states that the city's engines are in an unworkable condition; that the supply of fire hose is insufficient and useless and great stress is laid on the fact that there is no organized fire department. The one crumb of comfort in the situation lies in the acknowledgement that our water supply and pressure is perfectly adequate to meet any possible emergency. The fire marshal's report was considered at the city council meeting held Tuesday evening and in all probability a volunteer fire company will be organized, and fire fighting equipment overhauled and put in good condition."


