Of interest to Presbyterians is that there has been a net increase of 1257 members in the 147 Presbyterian churches in Oregon during the fiscal year ending Easter Sunday as shown by the annual report of the Rev. Walter M. Irwin, northwest secretary of the New Era movement, which was compiled during the past week. The denomination jumped from 15,882 members to 17,139. Actual accessions were 1668 by examination and 1450 by certificate, but the net gain was 1257.

The synod also shows a net gain of 2301 in the Sunday schools, \$13,340 in benevolences and \$37,282 in congregational expenses.
