

WANT CLOTHING FOR NEAR EAST WAR SUFFERERS

Arrangements are being made for an appeal to the people of Oregon for old clothing for the famine sufferers in the Near East.

The bolshevik control of Armenia has loosened up during recent months and New York headquarters of the Near East relief committee are rehabilitating the people there are opening up with prospects for settled conditions and final peace.

Medford, together with the other towns of Jackson county will be given an opportunity early next week to gather up its old clothing to contribute to this work of rescue.

The situation in China is also commanding attention. The crisis of the famine situation is fast approaching with the coming of spring, when typhus, plague and pestilence will add their quotas to the ghastly totals of death.

Owing to the utter desperation of the situation in China and the delay in completing arrangements for closing up the appeal for relief in Medford, the China Relief state headquarters have sent one of the field secretaries here to assist the local organization in reaching the people. Arrangements are being made with all the lodges and fraternal organizations, schools and churches for the matter to be taken up there, and funds collected as rapidly as possible.

UNIFORM COP NO BAR TO BANDITS

CHICAGO, May 12.—A uniformed policeman, assigned to escort a messenger for the State Commercial and Savings bank failed to daunt five bandits today. They held up the policeman and the messenger and escaped with approximately \$7,000, after first forcing the policeman to walk away a block, threatening to shoot him if he turned around.

ITALY LOOKS ON FUTURE GAILY BURDENS HEAVY

ROME, May 12.—Italy looks into the future with confidence in spite of the losses she sustained in the war and the burden her people are carrying at present, Giovanni Giolitti, the premier declared to the Associated Press last night. Signor Giolitti's statement, given on the eve of the elections which will give Italy a new chamber of deputies and lay before the world Italy's expression of national will, was full of optimism.

"We are on the threshold of the general elections," he said. "This is a source of great pride to me, for it seems the greatest proof that Italy is absolutely free of revolutionary tendencies. Elections are not signs of revolutions, but are, rather, certain proof of the contrary. We are looking forward to a new chamber of deputies in which the entire process of government will be able to function, which was virtually an impossibility in the last chamber. It is difficult to predict the precise results of the elections, but I can with almost certainty prophesy that in the next chamber the different parties will be more fairly represented will be grouped in such a way as to allow parliament to complete the task of economic, financial and social regeneration already begun."

SHARON, Pa., May 12.—The body of Powonia Miller, Gypsy princess, draped in a silk and satin burial robe, today rested on a catafalque in a tent mortuary awaiting burial late this afternoon. Among the mourners was the 84-year old father of Powonia, Louis Mitchell of Chicago, known as the king of all American Gypsies. Shortly after daybreak the mourners seated on the ground in the vicinity of the bier, partook of the solemn funeral breakfast. They were bareheaded and following tradition, had been neither washed nor shaved for three days.

TOLEDO—The boxing commission's new ruling that free admission to boxing shows in the future must be cut to the minimum had its effect last night when the crowd that turned out to see Bryan Downey and Johnny Klesch in a 12-round bout was less than half large enough to fill the hall.

SAN FRANCISCO—Jake Schaffer, San Francisco, won both halves in opening play yesterday of a 4,000 point match of 18.2 billiards from Edouard Horemans, Belgian champion. In 5 1/2 innings last night, Schaffer won 400 to 279. The score stood then 800 to 328.

EUGENE—Washington state college defeated University of Oregon's baseball team yesterday, 4 to 3.

MOSCOW, Idaho—The University of Idaho was defeated at baseball by Montana university yesterday 13 to 2.

EUGENE—The Pacific Coast conference track meet will be held May 21, whether or not the University of California or Stanford university teams participate, it is announced. The winner will be given the coast title.

RECORD CROWD TO SEE BIG BATTLE, FRENCH COMING

NEW YORK, May 12.—Although the opening of the public sale of seats for the Dempsey-Carpenter championship contest in Jersey City June 2, will not begin for several days the advance demand for reservations assures a record breaking attendance. Official diagrams of the arena, distributed today, indicate that the boxing amphitheater to be built by Promoter Tex Rickard will seat 50,000 or more spectators. The present plans provide for 35 rows of 50 seats and more than 100 mezzanine boxes. Back of these boxes are to be erected four rows of 40 seats and a similar number of 35 rows. These in turn are followed by 20 rows of 25 seats, three rows of 20, twenty-one rows of 15, twenty-five rows of 10 and eleven rows of 5 seats.

An order for fifty \$50 coupons was received from London last night with the information that additional seats would probably be required as several large parties of English sportsmen were planning to cross the ocean for the bout. A cable also announced that a bank order was on its way from Paris.

BATAVIA, N. Y., May 12.—A disagreement was reported today by the jury in the action brought by Frank P. Spellman against Jack Dempsey, the champion heavyweight boxer and Jack Kearns, his manager, for \$100,000. Spellman sought to recover a share in profits on motion pictures alleged to be due him under the terms of a verbal contract with Dempsey.

Rome, May 12.—Count Sforza, the Italian foreign minister, has indicated to Premier Togliatti his desire to retire from that post, according to newspapers here. It is said that he may be appointed Italian Ambassador to France.

LABOR REPORT ON BILLS, TWO NEW ONES ARE URGED

CINCINNATI, May 12.—A voluminous report prepared by the legislative committee of the American Federation of Labor was distributed today by the federation's executive council.

This report presented by President Samuel Gompers, contains a complete record of bills introduced in the last and the present congress, that affected the interests of organized labor.

Two new bills were also being considered by the council. They will be pressed in congress in the interest of labor. One of these bills, already introduced by Senator Johnson, calls for a congressional investigation into conditions in the West Virginia mining communities. The other bill would legalize the right of representatives of labor unions to solicit members, despite an individual contract they may have with their employers.

Bills in the present congress opposed by labor include Senator Poinsett's anti-strike bill; the Graham sedition bill and Representative Blanton's sedition and anti-picketing bill. The report approved Senator Borah's bill designed to protect the constitutional rights of the citizens of the United States, which it was stated which it was stated would also guarantee free speech and free assembly.
