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OMOTOYKO CULT PLANNED WORLD RULE BY JAPAN

TOKIO, May 12.—(By the Associated Press)—Revelations of the work carried on by the "Omotoyko" cult, which began when the police raided the headquarters of the organization at Ayala, near here, continue to astound the people of the empire. Newspapers accuse leaders of the cult of aspiring to set up an "Omotoyko" dynasty, to which all Japanese would flock with the hope of obtaining world dominion.
 In the temple of the organization at Ayala connected with the residence of Watanabe Deguchi, leader of the society, the police declare there were found crystals in which were placed the bodies of those who were slain for betraying the secrets of the organization.
 It is declared that "unspeakable crimes were committed against women" by members of the cult, who are said to have lacerated on fanaticism on their zeal.
 Cartoons of alleged seditious literature have been seized, including a famous volume bearing the title of "Fire."
 It is said that the followers of "Omotoyko" numbered 300,000.
 When the police seized the collection of pictures representing the divinity of the organization, a band of the faithful clinched their fists in fury, declaring the act of the officers to be sacrilegious.
