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## BULGIN ADDRESS TONIGHT INSURES LARGE AUDIENCE

Thursday night brought out another large and interested audience at the Bulgin-Lewis tabernacle meetings. The Woodmen of the World attended the service in a body. Mrs. Lewis sang a special solo in keeping with the subject of the sermon. One of the great messages of the meetings was given last evening on "The Man of Galilee." This message has been delivered by Dr. Bulgin a number of times on the chautauqua platform, and was highly appreciated by all who were present. The clear, logical presentation of the place of Christ in history was set forth in a most convincing way, and could not fail to have its effect on the mind of the most skeptical person.

Sunday afternoon the subject discussed will be "The Lean Cow," which should be heard by everybody, and in the evening Dr. Bulgin will discuss the question as to whether the Bible teaches the doctrine of a hell, and if so how can a God of love send any person to hell. Sunday promises to be another big day.

Dr. Bulgin tonight speaks on Christian Science. The subject will be treated, as has every other theme discussed, from a purely biblical point of view. Is Christian Science Biblical, or Unbiblical, is it scientific, or is it unscientific? Is it Christian, or is it anti-Christian? These subjects will be discussed and the same fair, logical treatment will be accorded the subject. It has been shown to the satisfaction of everybody who has heard Dr. Bulgin's great discourses. As a rule hundreds are turned away when Dr. Bulgin gives this message, so all who desire to hear this subject from the viewpoint of the bible are urged to be in their seats early. The personal workers will again meet at 7 p. m. tonight at the M. E. church, South. The Sunshine chorus is growing in numbers and interest. Elaborate preparations are being made to make the Working Women's luncheon next week a great success.

## ASHLAND AND VICINITY

ASHLAND, May 13.—Five thousand dollars is the estimate for the local chamber of commerce budget for 1921, and in line with this quota nearly a score of members of the organization have already been appointed to canvass business firms and individuals in order to raise this fixed amount. The \$5000 is placed as a minimum of what should be raised for this specific fund. As an indication of the spirit which is prompting the prosecution of this financial campaign, J. W. McCoy, cashier of the First National bank, pledged the chamber of commerce that the three banks of Ashland would subscribe an additional ten per cent of the amount raised for the budget. A tentative allotment of this budget, as planned, appropriates \$1500 for a Fourth of July celebration, \$1000 for the summer school, and \$1200 for a tent city on the chautauqua grounds, in the way of major expenditures, the balance of \$1300 to be reserved for minor purposes contingent upon emergent demands. No salaries or office expenses are to be drawn from this \$5000 budget. A chief feature entering into the Fourth of July celebration will be signaling completion of the mountain unit of the Pacific Highway as far as linking up the paved sections is concerned. This promises to be a notable event, even of interstate importance, as it is expected that Oregonians and Californians will join together in celebrating an event which means so much for both commonwealths. In other words, Jackson county, Oregon, and Siskiyou county, California, will join in a mutual justification over the completion of the "connecting link" in the improved highway and inasmuch as Ashland is to celebrate the Fourth anyway, the dual observance will be lined up here. The highway project is to be completed by July 1, allowing a few days in the meantime to perfect details of the joint celebration, a few certain formalities to take place on the actual state boundary limitations in a perfunctory way.

Of course it is taken for granted that those who subscribed towards the chamber of commerce budget last year will duplicate their donations this season also, at the same time influencing newcomers to fall into line also. The soliciting committee is headed by L. F. Ferguson, others of the personnel being H. H. Elhart, A. C. Briggs, W. H. McNair, T. H. Simpson, V. O. N. Smith, C. H. Pierce, Fred Engle, C. B. Lamkin, O. F. Carson, Homer Billings, Louis Dodge, A. C. Niningger, J. W. McCoy, Charles Rose, J. H. McGee, E. T. Staples, J. C. Raegi. This committee began early in the week at canvassing on the \$5000 budget basis.

The amount of the special budget raised last year was \$4200, of which principal \$1555 remained unexpended on or about May 1 of the present year. As we understand it, the budget fund is raised independently of receipts incident to membership dues, the membership of the chamber of commerce at present being 375, the members paying one dollar per month each.

## PETITIONS OUT TO PUT FAIR LEVY UP TO VOTERS

Petitions calling upon the county authorities to place a measure for a one mill tax for fair buildings before the voters at a special election, are being circulated in the county.

The Farm Bureau county fair committee requested the Medford chamber of commerce to have these petitions circulated in the city of Medford, which responsibility was accepted.

The names of approximately 2000 voters is necessary on the petitions in order to get it on the ballot. The law under which counties may tax themselves for the construction of fair buildings states that the measure containing such a levy must be voted upon at a special election, together with other provisions which would not permit voting upon this question at the election on June 7th.

The county fair committee of the Farm Bureau, in order to save the county the expense of the special election contemplate asking all of the judges and clerks of election to offer their services without pay. They believe the construction of proper fair facilities is of such importance to the county and farmers in particular that every citizen having anything to do with the county fair should volunteer his or her services the same as the members of the Farm Bureau and the Fair association are now doing.
