Last evening Dr. Bulglin gave another one of his forceful sermons, directed especially to the church people from the text, "Where Art Thou?" and "Where is Thy Brother?" The responsibility of church members to live right, and to become a direct agency for bringing people to Christ was brought home. The blame for the present conditions was laid on the church members themselves. Among other things said that went home are the following:

"If there is no personal devil there is no personal God."

"Everything is right in Rogue Valley excepting man."

"Many men don't come to the tabernacle because they are afraid of the light."

"You can dodge Bulglin, you can dodge the tabernacle, but you can't dodge God when He comes and calls you."

"America's standards are not what they used to be."

"Christianity is not a failure. Some one has kept the home fires burning."
