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GRAND JURY IN SESSION, LIST OF CASES LONG ONE

Sessions of the grand jury for the May term of court began at Jacksonville Monday morning. No return of indictments is expected before late Tuesday afternoon.

The grand jury will be asked to act upon indictments dismissed in Bank of Jacksonville cases at the last term of court, because of faulty wordings, etc., and return corrected indictments. It is not expected any new indictments will be returned in connection with the failure of the financial institution. The sessions will last most of the week.

The petit jury will convene next Monday, May 23, and give promise of having one of the heaviest dockets in the history of Jackson county, with crimes ranging from manslaughter to auto stealing on the calendar.

W. H. Johnson, serving a ten-year sentence in the state prison will be returned to testify in the cases of Mrs. Myrtle Blakeley, former county treasurer, and C. H. Owen, Salt Lake City oil man, in actions arising out of the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville.

Dr. Robert Parker Miles, who lectures here on the opening night of Chautauqua, was an intimate friend of the great Hoosier poet, James Whitcomb Riley. Dr. Miles treasures one of Riley's books particularly. It is an autographed copy of "Green Fields and Running Brooks," on the fly leaf of which Riley had written the following verse:

"There are many sorts of measures For our joys and for our pleasures, And the changing years still bring us newer styles;

So we hazard the conjecture That the test of a good lecture May best be measured off by Miles."

Dr. Robert Parker Miles has had an unusual life experience. He came to America at the age of 15, a penniless English lad. He lived for the first seven days and nights on fifty cents. Up to that time he had received no schooling and could not read. Yet in his thirties he had gone through a great university and was rated as one of the leading journalists of New York. He twice circled the globe interviewing the great celebrities of the time, including Bismarck, Gladstone, Pope Leo, the German kaiser, etc. His stories of these men in the New York Journal commanded national attention and he was urged to present the story of his interviews on the platform. He was an instantaneous success and for twenty years now has been one of the outstanding lecturers of the country. For ten years he has been in "Who's Who."
