Ordinance No. 1154.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the construction and erection of buildings within the City of Medford and declaring an emergency.

THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOETH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, person, firm, or corporation to erect, construct, or build any permanent dwelling house or other buildings within the corporate limits of the City of Medford without first having made written application to the city council for permission to construct such dwelling house or other building, and without having first received from the city council written permission to construct or erect such building or dwelling house. Such application must be signed by the person, firm or officer or agent, if a corporation, of such corporation, desiring to erect or construct such building or dwelling house, and shall show the name of the street and the lot or description of the property upon which the same is to be erected.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation who shall be found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or who shall fail or neglect to comply with any of such provisions, shall, on conviction thereof, be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for each offense, and ten (\$10.00) dollars for each day such person shall continue in violation thereof.

Section 4. Inasmuch as there is likelihood that structures which will or which may increase the danger of fire in said city of Medford, and inasmuch as it is for such reason necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the city that this Ordinance should become immediately operative, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately after its passage by the city council and approval by the Mayor.
