# CARPENTIER BOUT IN SPAIN PROVES A COMPLETE FROST

MADRID—Spaniards do not understand boxing—and do not want to, judging from some of the comments in connection with the recent exhibition given by Carpentier in Madrid, where he reproduced with Linaers, as his boxing partner his bout against Battling Levinsky.

The Diario Universal says: "When the great, incomparable, unique Carpentier entered the ring and noticed that there were not more than 200 spectators present, he was unable to refrain from a gesture of astonishment. Wherever he had exhibited previously the tickets had been sold out a fortnight beforehand and in some cases special trains had been run for the accommodation of 'fans.' The managers on this occasion must have suffered ruinously, for Carpentier's terms are high."

"The secret of this 'frost' is not far to seek. Spaniards do not use their fists. They prefer smacks. Fists hurt the adversary and, besides, it hurts one's hands to hit with them closed."

"We are a people of open hands and our anger shows itself more in words than in muscles. Should Spaniards come to blows, the necessary preliminaries are a long string of insults for the adversary and two or three generations of his ancestors. Then ensue a couple of smacks, after which the contestants embrace and hold each other so as to give time for the onlookers to separate them."

The newspaper concludes: "While boxing continues to be a fight with closed fists it will not catch on with us; but arrange a match with open hands and then we shall see a crowded gathering to witness it."

# FOLEY & BURKE SHOW IN CITY WEEK, MAY 24

The Foley and Burk Combined shows will open a five day's engagement at Medford, commencing on Tuesday of next week, May 24th on the lot north of the Big Pines lumber yard.

Foley and Burk have been coming to Medford for the past twelve years, and have had a clean show. The aggregation has graduated from the three car class of open air amusement and this season is traveling in its own special train of ten cars.

All of the equipment is devoted to the conveyance of show property, no sleeping cars being carried, hence the 150 people employed on the show have to eat and sleep at hotels and restaurants while here.

There are five big riding devices carried on the show. They are monster seaplanes, swung from a forty-foot illuminated tower; big ferris wheel, \$20,000 galloping horse carousel, 1921 model whip and the jazzwhirl or "human roulette wheel." The show consists of a miniature two-ring circus with fourteen pretty ponies, two trick horses, a funny mule, twenty or thirty dogs and as many clever monkey acts present a complete drama, jungleland, the Hawaiian village, the bungalow, and several others.
