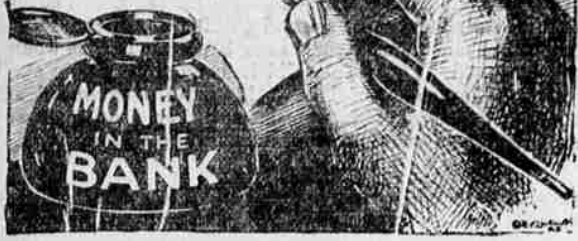

HEADQUARTERS, RENO, Nev., July 4.—1919.—Jim Jeffries will face Jack Johnson this afternoon in the monster arena here at Reno and try to prove to the world that a great fighter has come back.

In the last two or three days I have once again been over all parts of the valley, but I have viewed it from the upper deck of a Ford.

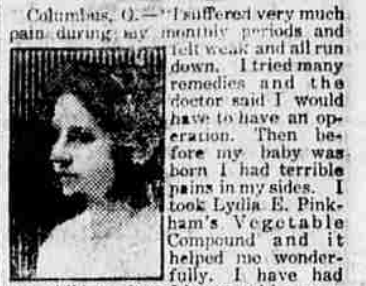
