FOLEY AND BURKE SHOW ARRIVES, TO OPEN UP TUESDAY

The Foley and Burke shows arrived by special train last evening from Redding and early this morning the employees of the amusement aggregation were busily engaged in unloading and transporting the paraphernalia to the show grounds opposite the Southern Pacific depot. The shows will open tomorrow evening for a period of five days. There are many new attractions with the Foley and Burke aggregation, over \$50,000 being spent during the past winter in adding equipment and amusement devices to this already large assortment. A new seaplane swing of the latest model accounts for the expenditure of \$10,000 and a 1921 model whip accounts for a like amount. The equipment of the company consists of ten cars, five of them flat cars carrying sixteen large wagons, filled to overflowing with show paraphernalia. The watchword of the Foley and Burke shows is and always has been cleanliness of attractions and a square deal to everybody. The fact that the shows play the same territory year after year and is much sought after by the big fair associations to furnish amusement is evidence that the policy is adhered to and with profit. Among the riding devices with the show are the seaplanes, Ferris wheel, galloping horse, carousel, 1921 model whip, and human roulette wheel. Among the shows carried are the two-ring circus, crazy house, Hawaiian village, monkeyland, jungleland, lobster boy and several others. The company carries an excellent concert band which will be in evidence on the show grounds each afternoon and evening while the company is here.

BULGIN FALSIFIER AND UNCHRISTIAN SAYS T. BURKHART

To the Editor: In your issue of the 14th, you report Dr. Bulgin's recent attack on Christian Science and its discoverer, and founder, Mary Baker Eddy, to which I ask the privilege of replying. All sincere seekers for truth desire to have any of their wrong impressions corrected, and I think your readers will want to hear something of the other side, in order that they may "judge righteous judgment." Dr. Bulgin prefaces his unchristian tirade with remarks which do not bear scrutiny. Our critic says he has taken "the course of lectures given by Mrs. Eddy personally, in Boston, designed for readers." That is not true. In the first place, there are no lecture courses designed for readers, and secondly our critic has never had personal instruction under Mrs. Eddy, yet he persistently repeats this false statement. He also says he is "not attacking this sect, but simply answering the attack they are making continually upon my church and my Christ." When he knows full well that while Christian Scientists reply to misrepresentations, they do not abuse or attack the religious beliefs of others, for we are taught to respect the rights of others and the sincerity of honest conviction wherever they find it. But there are so many false and misleading statements and unfair conclusions contained in these published criticisms, I cannot refrain from saying that I find it difficult indeed to understand how any self-respecting person can utter such vituperation and yet call himself a Christian. Certain it is, that Mrs. Eddy never set our critic any such example. I find it surprising, too, to find one, who claims to be unprejudiced, admits that he has "read Mrs. Eddy's book through thirty times," and yet grasps so little of her meaning and unable to see any good in her teachings, when thousands of others, intelligent and humble seekers for truth, have found healing for both body and mind by reading the book only once, and many by reading but one chapter, the chapter on prayer. Christian science is not a "religious system founded on mere health psychic suggestion," it does not use suggestion or hypnotism, which are the very antipodes of science; it does not deny Jesus' atonement nor his resurrection, the raising of Lazarus, nor the divinity of Christ, but it explains these things in a rational and logical manner. It is futile of course, to try to convince those who are not open minded enough to receive the message of truth "as a little child," for none are so blind as those who will not see. But to all who do have ears to hear,—to high and low alike—Christian Science appeals because of its irrefutable logic, founded as it is upon the teachings of the Master Christian and interpreting the Bible wholly from a spiritual standpoint. Thus interpreted, the Bible can be understood, and is consistent throughout, and wonderfully helpful in a most practical way,—solving the problems of our every day life. Viewed from the same stand-point, the spiritual interpretation of the scriptures, Mrs. Eddy's writings are seen to be entirely consistent with the Bible. The word "science" is defined as "knowledge of principles or facts." Christian Science is "Science" because it is knowledge of exact spiritual law of spiritual truth,—the truth about God, man, and the universe. It is "Christian" because it is based wholly upon the teachings of Jesus the Christ, and it is today restoring primitive Christianity in the way of his appointing, by healing the sick as well as the sinning. There is hardly a community of any size anywhere in the country where there are not to be found living witnesses to the fact that Christian Science does both, and that that it not only heals, but sometimes does so instantaneously, and not infrequently after all other means have been tried in vain. These testify, too, to the fact that the effects of Christian Science as taught by Mrs. Eddy are wholly beneficial, that the patient is in some degree uplifted morally and spiritually as well as healed physically. Should such a helpful influence be said to be "pernicious"? Our critic further says that Christian Science denies "sin and offers a bonus" in the way of a healthy body. Did Jesus "offer a bonus" of a healthy body when he healed the sick,

the halt, and the blind? Instead of denying any of the fundamental doctrines of the church of Jesus Christ, Christian Science teaches obedience to ALL of Jesus' teachings and commandments, not merely to a part of them. In Mark 16:17, 18 Jesus stated what "signs shall follow them that believe." He was addressing his disciples, but he did not say "you," but "them;"—"them that believe," in all times to come. That this healing power to which he referred was not confined to his immediate disciples, is proven by the fact that the Christian Church healed the sick as Jesus did, for about 500 years after his time. On numerous occasions Jesus emphasized his works of healing, as proofs of the ever presence of divine power,—evidence of a character every one could see and understand. The "signs" which Jesus enumerated as following them that believe included the healing of both sin (devils) and disease, which our Master healed by the same process. But did he treat either of them as something "real" (that is, God-made)? The Bible declares that God made all and all he made was good, and "without him was not anything made that was made." If sin and disease are creations of God, Jesus could not have overcome or destroyed them, neither could we, nor would it be right for us to try to do so. But they are not God-made, on the contrary, because he healed them by the human mind, which can be healed by its own consciousness. Jesus characterized all forms of evil beliefs as untrue, "a lie," saying of their origin that "the father and the father of it." Further ignorance of Mrs. Eddy's teachings is displayed when our critic says they are "very soothing to the conscience of the sinner." Christian Science explains that the sinner sins because he believes in the reality of sin and its fleeting pleasures, and continues to suffer from that belief so long as he sins. Mrs. Eddy says in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" on page 233 "Only those, who repent of sin and forsake the unreal, can fully understand the unreality of evil." The sinner can find in this teaching nothing whatever that is "soothing to his conscience" until indeed he ceases to be a sinner by forsaking his sin, repenting and reforming. Christian Scientists do not seek to preserve their religious liberty at the expense of the safety of their fellow-citizens, nor do they disregard the rights of others, but they are taught to obey the laws of the land. As Jesus pointed out, we may "render unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's" and yet render "unto God the things that are God's." Dr. Bulgin finds fault with the Christian Science conception of God. In Christian Science we learn that "It is our ignorance of God, the divine principle which produces apparent discord, and the right understanding of Him restores harmony."—restores harmony to mind and body. The Christian Science concept of God attributes to Him all life, truth and love, and we find the fruit of this right concept is good. Let this tree be "judged by its fruits." DR. BULGIN LASHES CHIEF OF POLICE AND CO. SHERIFF

Sunday was a busy day in the Bulgin-Lewis tabernacle meetings. Medford has seen various kinds of parades, but many saw Sunday for the first time a church parade. It was an inspiring sight to see the many hundreds in line including our boys and girls, as well as the fathers and mothers, who were advertising the moral side of life, which is after all the most important and essential in community building. The parade extended from the Medford hotel to the end of Main street and doubled back to the starting place. The evangelistic party headed the procession. Mrs. Bulgin walked with Dr. Bulgin, being here for the day. The pastors followed; then came the band, and people on foot, with the cars for blocks following. After the procession the women went to the Christian church, where they listened to a very practical and helpful address on matters of interest to women by Mrs. Lewis. Mr. Lewis talked to the Sunshine chorus at the Presbyterian church. The men and older boys filled the tabernacle, where Dr. Bulgin spoke on "Wine, Women, and Gambling." It was an arousing appeal to the manhood of the men, and for a clean-up in their lives and the life of the community. Dr. Bulgin addressed himself to the evils that prevail not only in the country at large, but in Medford. He handled the blind pig business in Medford without gloves, and blamed the conditions of inefficiency of certain officers who were not making good at this special point. Where you have, said the speaker, a weak chief of police and a no-account sheriff your judiciary is weak. Nothing will so breed anarchy as where the people violate the laws. Violation of one law leads to the violating of others. You will never have better government in this valley till you have better relations between your chief of police and your sheriff. The saloon is gone, but the blind pig still remains. I want to see a good Law and Order league of at least 300 good men formed to see that the laws of your city are enforced. This valley needs a higher moral public sentiment. If you want men of a high class to move here you must get rid of your blind pigs and your gamblers. If a good law cannot be enforced then the law enforcement officers are in collusion for an officer to permit liquor to be sold is to admit weakness. If you have a sheriff and a chief of police that can get a man who commits murder, or a man who steals, then if he does not catch a man who is a bootlegger he is either inefficient in office, or in collusion with others in office. Give me the right kind of men and I will clean up Medford in two weeks. If the officers can't stop bootlegging let them say so and we will put in some who can. Every person who buys bootlegging whiskey is a partner in the crime. You need not tell me that officers of the law cannot lock up 108 quarts of whiskey so it cannot be stolen over night. The evangelist dwelt upon the evils of gambling, and of immorality, all of which were well received and appreciated. The entire message should make for cleaner and better things in our community. The Presbyterian young people served a fine luncheon to the young people of the churches at 6 p. m. Dr. Bulgin again spoke to an audience that more than filled the tabernacle at 7 p. m. on "The Unpardonable Sin." The message showed how God longs to save every man, but man himself by long, persistent willful disobedience and neglect makes this impossible, and serves to produce a condition where the Holy Spirit is powerless to move the heart and mind of man. When man gets into that state he has committed the unpardonable sin, because he is hardened to all influences. He resists the Holy Spirit till finally the Holy Spirit refuses to make any more visits, knowing that it is useless. One may never know when saying no will seal his fate, and make further visits of God useless, but that time may come to any person, and has to very many. When that time comes it is useless to try to be religious, for the Holy Spirit has departed. More than thirty at the close of this strong appeal came forward. Tonight Dr. Bulgin has a message of special interest to all on "God's Measurements of Man." Tuesday will be High School night. Tuesday and Wednesday at 2 p. m. Mr. Lewis will speak at the Tabernacle on the Bible.
