PACIFIC COAST SHIP LINE WILL RESUME

SAN FRANCISCO, May 24.—The South American-Pacific Steamship company's line, which ceased operations at the beginning of the war, will resume its sailings between Seattle, Portland, San Francisco and South American ports, within the next two weeks, agents of the line here announced today.

The Norwegian steamer Pacific will steam from this port with a full cargo of lumber and general merchandise for Chilean and Peruvian ports in the first voyage of the re-established service.

POLAND AND THE LEAGUE.

THE fatal weakness of the League of Nations as at present constituted is demonstrated by the situation in Poland.

Take General Zeligowski, for example. Last fall he marched into Vilna at the head of 20,000 troops and announced himself dictator. The Polish government protested, the allies protested, the League of Nations protested, but Zeligowski remained, and there is every indication he will continue to remain.

When asked what he thought of the League of Nations, the general replied, "Frankly I haven't any confidence in the League of Nations, as far as our affairs are concerned. Why should I have? What have they ever done anyway. The league has never recognized Zeligowski, Zeligowski has never recognized the league. I guess we can settle our own affairs, if they will let us alone."

And the league has let him alone. It was natural that this successful defiance of the league should result in a discrediting of the organization entirely, as far as Poland is concerned, and the seizure of the coal mines in Upper Silesia followed as a natural consequence.

Obviously one of two things must happen before any League of Nations can be a practical force in world affairs. Either it must have ample force at its command to compel compliance with its decrees, or the spirit of selfishness and imperialism, which is so rampant in the world today and particularly in the Baltic states, must be destroyed, and an entirely different spirit take its place.

The former eventuality would of course, place the League of Nations in the role of a supergovernment, maintained by arms, and for its success depend upon the attainment of an even handed justice, which is not conspicuous in the councils of any European state today. In other words force to compel an unrighteous decree, would not be sustained by public opinion, and would merely throw the regions affected into the throes of conflict again.

It is, therefore, becoming more apparent every day, that General Smuts was right when he said the League of Nations did not fail the world, but the world failed the League of Nations. Until there is a spirit among the people of the world, of tolerance, of unselfishness, a willingness to subordinate the predatory ambition of one state within that state to the welfare of all states, neither the League of Nations now existing nor any other League of Nations, can be more than a scrap of paper.

The world must have a spiritual rebirth. When that has occurred, and not until it occurs, will the dream of the league advocates come true.
