RECEIPTS DEMPSEY FIGHT NOW OVER HIGHEST RECORD

NEW YORK, May 26.—The Dempsey-Carpenter fight already has broken all box office records. With the date of the bout five weeks distant, Promoter Tex Rickard today announced that the receipts had reached \$225,000.

Receipts of the Dempsey-Willard battle at Toledo, Ohio, July 4, 1919, constituted the previous record of \$152,522, nearly twice as much as the high mark which had been established by the Johnson-Jeffries battle at Reno, Nev., in 1910 when Rickard gathered in \$279,745.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 26.—Forced into a day of idleness because of the rain and cold weather of yesterday, Jack Dempsey today resumed training activities eagerly with a full day's work ahead of him. Dempsey planned to go on the road for a six-mile run, if the rain-soaked roads proved sufficiently dry to make the going comfortable. His regular program of bag punching, shadow boxing and work with the gloves will be carried out this afternoon.

The champion's staff was augmented by the arrival of Joe Benjamin, a Pacific coast lightweight, and Bull Montana, a middleweight wrestler from Los Angeles.

Benjamin was scheduled to do his first boxing with the champion today. He is training for a bout here Saturday night. Montana intends to wrestle with Dempsey every day.

MANHASSET, N. Y., May 26.—Paul Journee, French heavyweight and sparring partner of Georges Carpentier, aspirant to the world's heavyweight boxing title, looks, beside Georges, like the slier of the Grand Canyon to the heroes. His great hands, reminding one of the chafe picnic ham, hang almost to his knees. Paul has to stoop to pass through the ordinary doorway and his shoulders are so broad the rest of his body seems to hang, like fringe on a lady's dress. He never smiles, this giant—he just scowls. Every now and then he growls, whereupon the camp shakes.
