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NEW REVOLUTION IN RUSSIA NOW EXPECTED DAILY

COPENHAGEN, May 26.—A Helmsing dispatch to the Berlingske Tidende today says the Petrograd workers are demanding that the Russian government be transferred to a body representing all political parties. The soviet government, the dispatch says, has prohibited the newspapers from mentioning strikes or other signs of unrest. Striking workers, attempting to flee Petrograd for the country districts are punished by hard labor whenever they are caught, the dispatch continues. Soldiers are participating in demonstrations. The report says that in Moscow the rations of even the soviet government have been reduced to a minimum, adding that Cossacks are repeatedly employed to break up meetings and strike demonstrations of hostile workers. Even the paper money factories have been closed there and the situation is described as very critical and it is declared a revolutionary outbreak of a violent nature is expected daily.
