ALL ASHLAND TO JOIN OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY

ASHLAND, May 27.—Memorial day will be more than ordinarily observed. Schools are out, while the banks, post office, and business houses in general will be closed on a Sunday basis. The American Legion takes the initiative, very appropriately, in arrangements for the observance, and in the words of its preliminary announcement, "Joy rides and fishing trips are all called off in view of the Memorial event. Everybody is expected to attend the ceremonies of the day with the old and young soldiers, the Relief Corps, Spanish vets, and Daughters of the American Revolution. The Boy Scouts will be very much in evidence as a special escort for the veterans, the Relief Corps, and American Legion Auxiliary. The charter of the Women's Auxiliary of the American Legion has been received, and the organization is being perfected, eligibility for affiliation depending upon near relationship either to present members of the legion or to service men who paid the supreme sacrifice. The memorial monument is already in place, its location being in Ashland cemetery, where it will be unveiled next Monday with appropriate ceremonies. The Memorial Day exercises will be held at the armory, with Col. John L. May as speaker at the event. Incident to the observance both at the armory and Ashland cemetery, a party will be detailed to decorate the burial plots in Harzardine and Mountain View cemeteries. Decoration day, familiarly so termed, calls to mind that Oregon men in the world war numbered 34,500, of which number 954 lost their lives. Over 1000 wounded men returned home after the war, 200 of whom are permanently disabled. On Tuesday, June 7, at a special election, voters will be up on a proposition involving a loan to help these men in a tangible way. Vote "Yes."

Not less than one hundred cottage prayer meetings will take place here in connection with the revival campaign conducted under Bulgin auspices, the evangelistic work to begin early in June. A general committee incorporating a score of names has been appointed, with Mrs. J. W. Hoyt, chairman, 82 Allison street, whose assistants include Mesdames Stella Leavitt, W. A. Patrick, L. L. Hedrick, J. V. Wright, A. Engle, C. F. Koehler, J. M. Ross, O. E. Carson, C. W. Hammond, E. J. Van Sant, H. A. Spencer, H. O. Butterfield, W. A. Cooper, G. H. Way, M. E. Doslough, H. B. Pummer, and Miss Caribel Morehouse. These meetings will supplement the major revival services to be held in the chautauqua auditorium, and are expected to act as "recruiting stations" in furthering interest and attendance in behalf of the good work which will be energetically managed here.

Fire last Tuesday did considerable damage to the Carter property, a familiar old residence in the vicinity of Gresham and Vista streets, commodious in proportions and manorial as to associations, it having been in possession of the Carter family since a date well nigh into the pioneer classification. The old home is occupied by the H. S. Sanford family. The fire was discovered in the roof. A deluge of water to offset the flames added to the damage in general. The Valley View school district is also introducing the movies along lines of instruction and entertainment, and on Saturday evening, May 28, a series of films will be exhibited under parent-teacher association auspices. "The Vista Apartments," named after the street on which they are located, have recently been completed by Mrs. F. L. Putnam, this installation helping in solving the housing problem. Two stories in height, the building is so constructed that each individual renter has the advantage of enjoying an outside apartment, with privileges of a community laundry in the basement. Gas and electric ranges are notable installations. The Dead Indian road is still in the limelight, and justly so. Year after year the problem of improving that highway is exploited, and ultimately something is going to be accomplished otherwise than mere temporary expedients. Ed P. Moore, good roads enthusiast and booster in behalf of all substantial improvements, has been before the county court again of late, urging that something be done in the premises.

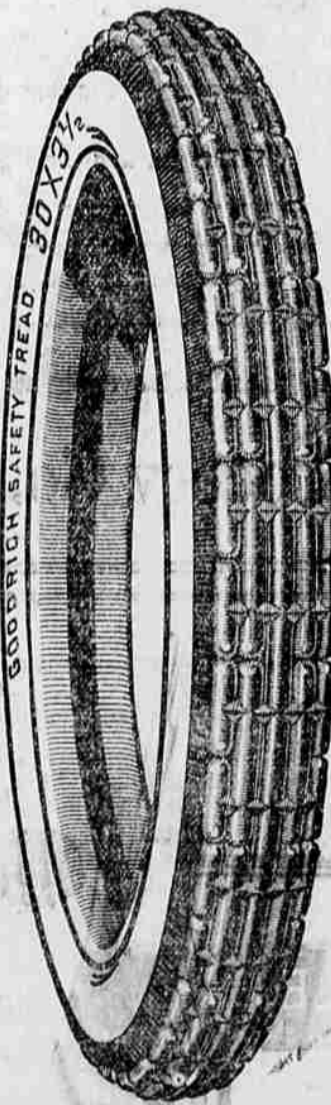
