COBB AND SPEAKER HIT STRIDE, BABE RUTH HAS SLUMP

CHICAGO, May 28.—Managing a ball club seems to be conducive to heavy hitting for Ty Cobb, pilot of the Detroit Tigers and Tris Speaker, manager of the Cleveland Indians, are giving Harry Heilmann of Detroit a terrific fight for batting leadership of the American league.

Cobb boosted his mark from .335 last week to .411 for this week, according to averages released today, and which included games of last Wednesday, while Speaker raised his last week's average of .378 to .408. Heilmann, although he suffered a batting slump, is fourteen points ahead of Cobb. Heilmann's average is .425 as compared with .454 a week ago.

Severid of St. Louis also has come to the front in grand style. The slugger catcher of the Browns has attained a mark of .351 and is in fourth place.

Babe Ruth, the king of home run hitters, ran into a slump when the Yankees hit the western trail of the circuit. His batting average dropped from .378 to .345. The big slugger failed to get any four-baggers while in Chicago, but in the final game at St. Louis Wednesday he cracked out a drive which was said to be the longest made at the Browns' park and not brought his total string of home runs up to 13. Shocker was pitching. George Kelly, the New York Giants' slugger, who is leading the National, failed to add to his total of eight and is now five behind the American league rival, "Babe" Ruth. Heilmann of Cincinnati, failed to increase his stolen base record. He leads, however, with eight thefts.

Other leading hitters: Johnston, Brooklyn .356; Tierney, Pittsburgh, .352; Kelly, New York, .347; Barber, Chicago, .342; Harrgrave, Cincinnati, .340; Cuthaw, Pittsburgh, .319.

RUSSIA AND TURKEY FORM ALLIANCE

ATHENS, May 26.—Soviet Russia and the Turkish nationalist government have agreed to a treaty based upon mutual aid for the emancipation of all peoples of the east, and the absolute right of self-determination. It is announced here. The treaty denounces all past or conventional imposed by force upon Turkey. The protocol, signed by representatives of the two nations January 29, 1920, which disposed of territory along their frontiers, was made effective, it is said. Batum was given to Georgia and Azerbaijan made an autonomous state. The soviet government has released Turkey from all economic engagements entered into by that country with Russia during the czarist regime.
