Forest patrol by the 91st aero squadron started in Washington, June 1 and will start in Oregon June 15, says Captain Lowell H. Smith. The captain will leave today for Camp Lewis to be on hand during the first days of the patrol work which is starting early in the northern state. Three planes will make daily circuits of the timbered area of Oregon starting the 15th of the month. Two of the ships will be sent out from the Eugene field which is the headquarters of the squadron and one from Medford, another base, thinks the captain whose plans are not definitely settled on the matter. A total of 127,000 square miles of timber in Oregon and Washington will come under the trained eyes of the 91st's observers each day during the fire season it is estimated by Captain Smith. Of this area 95,000 square miles will be in Oregon.—Eugene Register.
