According to a statement issued at Salem this week on the teacher supply by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, unemployment has had no visible effect upon the teacher supply in Oregon. He declares that competent instructors are as scarce now as they were a year ago. Any number of inexperienced candidates for teaching positions are available, Churchill admits, but he insists that there are more openings for competent, experienced teachers than there are applicants qualified to fill such positions. Teachers' salaries will remain much as they were for the past year, Mr. Churchill says. In a few instances, especially among the smaller schools, salaries are being slightly trimmed but this is being more than offset by increases offered by schools which are seeking the better qualified teachers.
