TILDEN TO MEET BELGIAN YOUTH TENNIS FINALS

ST. CLOUD, June 3.—(By Associated Press.) William T. Tilden of Philadelphia, world's grass court tennis champion, will meet M. Washer of Belgium in the final of the world's hard court tennis championship. Washer, who is a mere youth, and learned to play tennis with the American commission for relief in Belgium during the war, defeated Erik Tegner of Denmark in the semi-finals. Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory, the American women's single champion, gained a place in the finals by defeating Madame Billout.

ST. CLOUD, June 3.—(By Associated Press.) William T. Tilden, of Philadelphia, world's grass tennis singles champion, advanced to the final round of the world's hard court championship tournament in progress here today by defeating Nicolas Mihal of Rumania by 6-3, 6-3, 6-2.

ST. CLOUD, June 3.—(By Associated Press.) The American mixed doubles tennis team, composed of Arnold Jones of Providence and Miss Edith Bloum of Boston was eliminated from the hard court championship tournament here today. The Americans were defeated in straight sets by the French team, composed of M. Hirsch and Madame Figneron. The score was 6-0, 6-0.

ST. CLOUD, June 3.—(By Associated Press.) The American men's doubles team, William T. Tilden of Philadelphia, and Arnold Jones of Providence was eliminated from the world's hard court championship tennis competition this afternoon by the French pair, Andre Gobert and William H. Laurentz. The Frenchmen won a hard-fought five set match, 4-6, 6-2, 6-2, 1-6, 6-4.

GENEVA, June 3.—(By the Associated Press.) The International Olympic committee today awarded the 1924 Olympic games to Paris. Amsterdam was awarded the 1928 games.

LONDON, June 3.—(By the Associated Press.) The appointment of Lord Byng of Vimy as governor general of Canada in succession to the Duke of Devonshire, was announced officially today.

SURVIVOR GREELY EXPEDITION, NORTH POLE, PASSES AWAY

SAN JOSE, Cal., June 3.—Maurice Connell, United States weather forecaster here and said to have been one of three surviving members of the Greely expedition to the Arctic, 1881-84, died here today, aged 69 years. Two members of the party still are alive and reside in the east.

Maurice Connell was one of the seven near-dead, emaciated men Commander Winfield Scott Schley found when he went to the relief of Lieutenant A. W. Greely's Arctic expedition in 1884.

The Greely expedition, consisting of twenty-five men, had set out in 1881 to establish an international polar station. It reached 83 degrees, 24 minutes latitude, then the farthest north, discovered new land north of Greenland and crossed Grinnell Land to the great Polar sea. They came to the tragedy. The expedition failed to meet the relief ship Proteus, which had been crushed in the ice and was forced to take refuge near bleak Cape Sabine, where many perished of starvation. One member of the party was ordered shot by Greely for the repeated theft of food. When Commander Schley found the seven survivors they had been 42 hours without food of any kind.

Connell, unconscious when found was for the moment thought dead. For three days he lay in a stupor and when revived aboard the ship he thought himself in another world.

"When I was weighed three weeks after the rescue, I weighed 192 pounds—my normal weight at that time was around 175 pounds," Mr. Connell said in telling of his experiences.

Before going north Mr. Connell for ten years served in the army in the west. He fought Apaches in Texas and Arizona, Sioux in Nebraska, served under General Cook, a famous Indian fighter, and was one of the few survivors of the Battle of Little Big Horn, in which General Custer lost his life.

Mr. Connell was placed on the retired list of the army in 1901 and in 1905 became weather forecaster at San Jose.

SHIP SETTLEMENT IS DECLARED OFF

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Negotiations between marine engineers and the shipping board for a settlement of the dispute on wages and working conditions have been broken off. W. S. Brown, president of the Marine Engineers Beneficial association, declared today.

The failure to reach a settlement, Brown said, was due to the refusal of the shipowners and the shipping board to include a clause providing for the reinstatement of striking engineers.

"We could not sign an agreement that would force our men to work with the strikebreakers who had taken the jobs of union men," he said.

BOY MURDER CASE JURY DISCHARGED

KNOX, Ind., June 3.—The jury trying the case of Cecil Burkett, 11 charged with the murder of Benny Slavin, 7, was discharged by Judge Pentecost in circuit court today when it failed to reach an agreement.

The jury had been out 18 hours. No information concerning the number of ballots taken was divulged. The boy remained at liberty on bond.

The little Burkett boy smiled when the jury was discharged, apparently not realizing just what it meant. He had maintained throughout his trial that he did not shoot the Slavin boy.

The case was the first in Indiana in which so young a defendant was tried on a murder charge.

JAPAN WILL DEMAND RIGHTS ON PACIFIC

TOKIO, May 3.—(Delayed.) In publishing here the documents concerning the mandate arrangements made at the peace conference sessions and by the League of Nations' council concerning Germany's overseas possessions which have formed a subject of controversy between Japan and the United States the foreign offices attaches its reservation made in connection with "equal opportunities" in the German islands in the Pacific ocean. This publication shows that Japan has not abandoned its claim for equality of treatment for its nationals in the islands which were turned over to Australia and New Zealand. The Jiji Shimbun emphasizes that the Japanese government has plainly reserved the right to take up the matter with the British government.

DEMURRERS FILED IN BANK CASES

Demurrers have been filed in all these indictments, and will be argued at an early date.

MOB LED BY COUNTY ATTY. SEIZES RECORDS

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., June 3.—A group of persons, described in a telegram received by District Judge Paine as a "mob" and led by County Attorney Farris A. Relsner, according to information received here, yesterday seized the records of the county clerk and clerk of the district court of Thomas county at Theftord, Neb. It is believed the seizure was made to prevent possible action against Relsner against whom ouster proceedings were said to have been demanded following conviction of County Treasurer J. L. Heilman, who was prosecuted by Relsner on a charge of embezzling county funds.

PEACE RESOLUTION WILL PASS HOUSE

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The house foreign affairs committee with democratic members dissenting, voted today to report the Porter resolution for abolishing the state of war between the United States and Germany and Austro-Hungary.

Republican members voted solidly to adopt the Porter measure as a substitute for the Knox resolution passed by the senate repealing the declaration of war. The democrats merely voted present.

Chairman Porter announced the resolution would be presented to the house next week for immediate consideration. A minority report will be filed by committee reports.

House leaders informed Chairman Porter that the resolution would be given the right of way when presented.

BERLIN, June 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—Salomon Tedirian, the Armenian student who in March last shot and killed Talaat Pasha, former grand vizier and minister of finance of Turkey, was acquitted in the assize court today.
