Miss Golda Boone delivered an oration on "Life Is What We Make It," which was very well composed and well given. Miss Cora Long, representing the eighth grade, gave their class poem, and Miss Evelyn Childers gave the class prophecy, which was clever and amusing. The address of the evening was given by Professor Irvin L. Vining of Ashland. Prof. Vining gave a splendid address, which not only appealed to and inspired the young graduates, but all present. He spoke of the won-

derful opportunities open to graduates of the American high school, and ways to achieve success. One must not, however, Prof. Vining concluded, in pursuing his life's work, forget the art of living; to be a friend to one's fellowmen and do one's best are two of the greatest things in life. The presentation of the diplomas was made by Nellie W. Fick, chairman of the board of education. BULGIN REVIVAL
SERVICES HERE

Dr. Bulgin will speak on "How to Hold Out" in connection with his discourse on "Sweethearts." This will be out of the usual line, and will interest everybody. Sunday closes the campaign. Aside from the Sunday schools no services will be held in the churches. Prompt attendance will be called for at all the Sunday schools as the first service at the tabernacle will begin at 10:30 a. m. The theme of the sermon will be "What Puts Man in Tune With the Infinite." Mrs. Lewis will sing "Unanswered Yet." Mrs. Lewis' singing has been greatly enjoyed by the people, as well as her playing at the piano. At 2:30 p. m., Dr. Bulgin will speak on "The Sin of Barrenness; the Black Sin in Human History." The Law and Order league will be launched at that time. Several hundred have indicated a desire to join such an organization. It is not to be associated with the churches, but will be a community affair, with the purpose of assisting the officers in every good work. The farewell service will take place at 7 p. m., and will doubtless be a great overflow meeting. The young people will be served lunch at the Christian church, where their last meeting will be held. These meetings have been well attended and of great interest and help, under Mr. and Mrs. Lewis. Friday at 4 p. m., the boys and girls sunshine chorus had their final meeting and were given a feed, which they enjoyed. The work with the boys and girls has been of a high order. Last night Dr. Bulgin spoke on "The Philosophy of Faith," using the healing of blind Bartimeus as an illustration. The story was told in a graphic way, and held the attention of all. The lesson and reasonableness of faith was told in a striking way which showed how simple and yet essential faith is in the plan of salvation. When Christ opened the eyes of Bartimeus, said the speaker, some one could see that Bartimeus could see. In other words, if religion does the one who has it different from the man who does not have it, then that person's religion does not amount to anything. The trouble with the church is that the standards are not high enough. Bartimeus knew what he knew, and did not let the things he did not know effect him. Some people are going to hell over the things they do not know. Bartimeus knew that he could see. Seeing was a mystery, but it was also a reality with him. A mystery in religion is keeping not a few people in Medford out of heaven. Yet these same people do not refuse to ride on the street car because they do not understand how electricity can make the cars go. Our country is in great need of religion, when the bible is read in the public schools and there is less dancing and card playing, our young people will be better off. In the east they are legislating to put the bible back into the schools. One does not need to have a big faith to be saved. One can fly hold of God with a little amount of faith. He needs just enough to pull him to Jesus. Bartimeus put off his garments, in other words he cast aside the hindering things and finally he made a cry for mercy. When Christ stops pleading it will be a dark day for all of us.

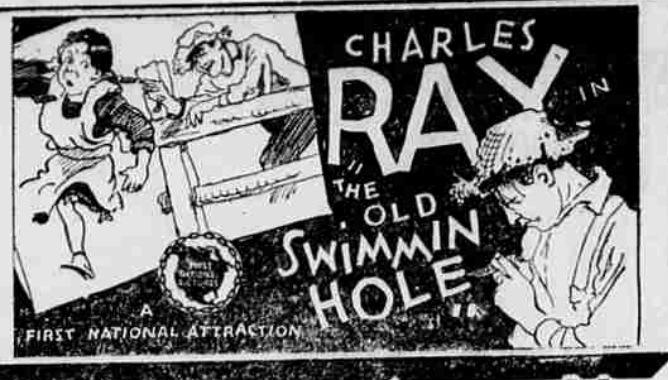

TRIGONIA WELL
DOWN 1200 FT.

The Trigonía well resumed drilling Monday at a depth of 1190 feet. A short piece of cable, key-bolt from slip, and a small piece of slip dropped in while fishing, had to be drilled out. This made progress very slow. The well is now down 1200 feet, and the iron that delayed drilling is practically all out. The formation has changed to hard gray sand stone, slightly mixed with a brown sand resembling oil sand. There was quite a showing of oil when the well was last bailed. Shut down two days on account of fuel. The force will drill Sunday.
