Notice

Unlawful to Fire Slashing During Certain Seasons Without Permit. During the period between June 1st and October 1st, which is hereby designated the closed season, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to set on fire or cause to be set on fire, any slashing, chopping, woodland or brush land either his or their own on the property of another, without written or printed permission from a fire warden, and the compliance thereof, which shall prescribe the conditions upon which the permit is given and which are necessary to be observed in setting such fire and to prevent it from spreading so that life or property of another may be endangered thereby.

Burning permits can be obtained from any authorized State Fire Warden.
