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C. OF COMMERCE DECIDES TO PUSH CO. FAIR PROJECT

The question of whether Medford is going to support the building and improvement project of the county fair was placed squarely before the members of the Medford Chamber of Commerce by the Farm Bureau at a meeting held at the public library last evening.

This became necessary because of an insufficient number of names on petitions requesting the county authorities to call a special election at which the voters of the county might express their opinion as to what extent they were willing to support the building program.

There was no opposition to the request of the Farm Bureau and a pledge was secured whereby Medford citizens would do their share to secure signatures to place the measure upon the ballot.

In the analysis of the one mill tax measure to secure sufficient funds for building and improvement purposes at the fair grounds it was shown that the assessed valuation of properties of the farmers is such that he would pay but 33 per cent of the cost. The city man upon his assessment of city properties, merchandise, shares of stock and office furniture would pay 27 per cent, whereas the timber men and public service corporations such as power companies and railroads would pay 40 per cent of the cost.

With these facts before the members, together with a complete draft of roadways, walks, proposed buildings and race track, they decided that the fair grounds should be improved immediately in order to have a fair this fall and that there would be nothing gained by waiting, in fact a delay was considered to be detrimental to the farming and stock interests of the county.

It was shown that of the names which had been secured to the petitions that very few women voters had signed, due undoubtedly to their not having been given the opportunity. Committees volunteered to circulate petitions and Medford is being thoroughly canvassed. A petition is on file at the Chamber of Commerce rooms for those to sign who wish the fair grounds improved.
