SHIP HITS MINE, HUNDREDS LOST

ATHENS, June 10.—Many lives are believed to have been lost in the sinking of the Greek steamship Boubouline which struck a mine and foundered in the Aegean. The Greek battleship Lemnos has arrived at Piraeus from Smyrna with two passengers who were picked up. Details of the disaster are lacking.

PARIS, June 10.—The mail packet Boubouline which has been sunk in the Aegean had 210 passengers on board, beside a crew of 25, says an Athens dispatch to the Radio agency.

The Boubouline was formerly the steamer Coronilla. She was built at Newcastle, England, in 1878 and was owned by J. G. Bouboulis, of Spezia. She was 258 feet long and had a beam of 32 feet. Her registered tonnage was 1312.
