RUSSELL ON JAPAN.

THE articles written by Charles Edward Russell on Japan, now being printed in The Mail Tribune, have thrown considerable light on conditions in the Orient, but in one particular, we believe Mr. Russell is mistaken. His mistake is in ascribing prejudice against Japanese colonization on the Pacific coast, to trouble-making newspapers.

The newspapers, as a whole, have been guilty of no anti-Japanese propoganda. They have merely recognized a condition, and in opposing further encroachments of an alien race, have merely reflected an overwhelming sentiment of the people.

The opposition to Japanese colonization, has not proceeded from a desire to have trouble with Japan, but as Governor Olett has said, to prevent trouble. Unless Japan is made to understand that the extension of the yellow race problem on the Pacific coast, means serious complications, then a clash of interests sooner or later can not be avoided.

The recent demand for preventative legislation in Oregon, proceeded from a desire to attack the problem at its inception, rather than to wait until a large influx of Japanese, should render the problem peaceably insoluble. We think Mr. Russell would find profit in his researches, by a personal investigation of conditions in California before he expresses his final judgment.

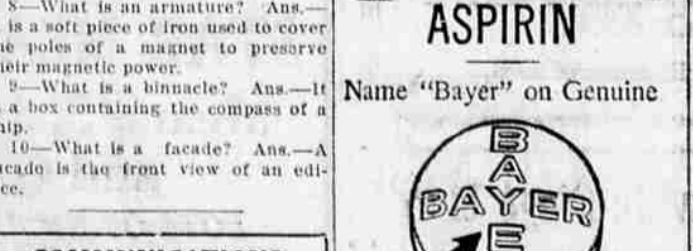
