

GREATER ACTIVITY FOR COUNTY FAIR OR PROJECT FAILS

Unless there are a greater number of voters who sign the petitions for a special election and unless the committees appointed to secure signatures show a greater activity before next Monday evening, the chances for a fair this fall or for the improvement of the fair grounds will be very slim.

Unlike the call for most special elections where a certain percentage of voters at the last general election can petition for a special fair improvement election, the county attorney rendered an opinion for the Farm Bureau that it was necessary to secure the names of 15 per cent of the total registered voters. There are 10,521 registered voters in Jackson county and the names of 1589 are necessary to call this election for county fair improvement. At the present time 913 voters have signed the petition but there remains 677 to be secured before the county authorities may order the election.

Unless the voters of Jackson county volunteer their signatures to the petitions there will be no fair this fall, as the fair grounds cannot be made ready for same. A petition is on file at the Chamber of Commerce rooms.

Ring Sketches of Bygone Years

Only a little more than two years were given to Bob Fitzsimmons in which to enjoy the glamour and the gold that accompanies a heavyweight championship. The honor was knocked from his sturdy shoulders by James J. Jeffries, the ponderous Californian, on June 9, 1899 at Coney Island.

Jeffries had graduated from a boiler-making establishment into the roped square with two rugged fists that pounded Fitzsimmons into submission in 11 rounds, scoring three knockdowns before the knockout.

Jeffries moved cautiously in the ring until his fire was aroused whereupon he would create a thunderbolt with one of his fists. The first knockdown was in the second round.

Fitzsimmons' whirlwind attack tired him and in the tenth round Jeffries knocked him down twice. In the next round the Californian landed a zipping drive over the champion's heart and followed it through with rights and lefts to the jaw. Those blows dazed Fitzsimmons and Jeffries sent him down for the full county with a crushing right-hand blow to the chin.

RESIGNATION GENERAL MITCHELL DEMANDED

WASHINGTON, June 9.—The resignation of Brigadier General Mitchell as assistant chief of the air service has been requested by Major General C. T. Menoher, chief of the army air service, in written recommendations to the secretary of war. Repeated published statements by General Mitchell, urging a unified air service made since President Harding addressed congress in opposition to such unification, was said to have been one of the reasons prompting the request that the officer be relieved of his present assignment.
