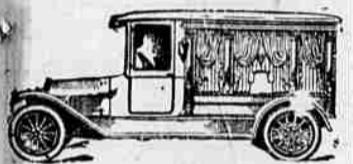

ASHLAND URGES A FITTING MARKER FOR STATE LINE

Granite City Launches State Movement to Erect Appropriate Monument On Pacific Highway—Winburn's Whiskey Attracts California.

ASHLAND, June 10.—If New York has its renowned statue of "Liberty Enlightening the World," the Ashland gateway to and from Oregon and California over the Pacific Highway will have a state boundary marker, monumental as to artistic design and imposing regarding physical proportions. Frank Jordan, local contractor, who has done a lot of work along the highway in the line of concrete bridges, has agitated the matter of having an appropriate marker at the boundary line, and this persistent agitation on his part is leading to something more tangible than mere blue print plans and specifications, which have already been submitted to Architect Hoyt of this city. The sketch outlines a monument nearly 50 feet high, with pillars each side of the highway. Its base will be of native granite, on which will rest a redwood block over 10 feet in circumference and five feet high, surmounted by a fir log perpendicular capped with a round ball chiseled from Oregon pine. The "ingredients" entering into its composition are all to the manor born, representing to an eminent degree natural products of Oregon, and legends on "Memorial tablets" will set forth data as to constructive materials employed. The monument representing a commonwealth enterprise, and not merely a local one, it is planned to enlist state aid in its erection. Hence the secretary of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce, now attending a gathering of the State Chamber in Portland, will bring this matter before that body with the view of securing its cooperation in the movement to appropriately mark the Oregon-California state boundary line.

A day postal received here Wednesday morning, from employees of a big corporation in San Francisco, several of whom formerly resided here, was cabled in plain English, code language being not permissible, and was worded as follows: "Kindly ad-

Managers include Anna Morrison, Coquille; Priscilla McLean, Riddle; Alma Allingham, Colburn. District No. 12 includes territory extending from Ashland to Eugene, and westward to the coast. Mrs. Mabel Roberts of Ashland, was elected one of the delegate alternates to the grand circle session of the order, which meets in Portland July 15. Sentiment of the gathering crystallized into one of sympathy for Mrs. Van Orsdal, supreme guardian, in the contention no warring had with state insurance authorities over the status of the Neighbors of Woodcraft in fraternal circles. The visitors were royally entertained while here by Acorn Circle No. 54, and the new officers were installed by Mrs. Mary Whitney, former well known resident of Oakland.

The revival meetings are well attended and growing in interest. The Chautauqua auditorium is so large, that even a good sized audience seems a medium one by comparison. A platform has been extended from the stage, thus placing Evangelist Bulgli on the same literal footing as that upon which Billy Sunday stood, while here some time ago during the Chautauqua season. This platform "extension course" also adds to the acoustic properties of the big auditorium. This week there has been a series of denominational gatherings, or at least they have been termed such. It is understood that the exhorter-in-chief is a blue Presbyterian,

one assistant is a hardshell Baptist, while another is a howling Methodist. Upon these respective bases there is some good natured rivalry connected with the denominational rallies, leading to a broader vision of Christian unity, an ultimate attainment which is the expectation of all orthodox in the "final analysis," as we term it. For a brief period there threatened to be a little friction, and the local paper was criticised, more from the business than the revival standpoint, but all this has evidently been settled "out of court," and nothing could be fairer than the journalistic attitude now maintained toward the evangelistic movement. Furthermore, who knows, but what the newspaper man, "almost persuaded to become a Christian," may yet play the part of editorial understudy to the exhorters? Stranger things have seldom happened, and the Lord only knows the newspaper man needs it. In the meantime Satan is being lashed perennially, and certain peace officers—notably Sheriff Terrell—are being given hell intermittently.
