OFFICIAL COUNT CONFIRMS RESULT LOCAL ELECTION

The official count of votes cast last Tuesday in the special election shows that three measures on the ballot carried in Jackson county, the bonus bill by a majority of 1456; the hygienic marriage bill by a majority of 282 and the Emergency clause veto bill by a majority of 643.

The bonus bill carried in every precinct but Willow Springs where it was defeated by one vote. The same precinct voted against all the other measures.
