NEW YORK, June 11.—Low records for a year or more were made by leading issues in the course of today's short but moderately active dealings on the Stock Exchange. Further depression seemed to result largely from the more aggressive operations of shorts, but signs of additional liquidation were not lacking. Oils, including Standard Oil of New Jersey and Mexican Petroleum lost two to five points. Steels and equipments, notably Crucible, Harvester preferred, New York Airbrake and General Electric fell one to three and a half and motors, sugars and tobaccos forfeited one to three points. Coalers were heaviest of the rails, declining one to three points but Southern Pacific preferred showed conspicuous strength. The closing was heavy. Sales approximated 400,000 shares.

Notice. A new law passed by the last session of legislature provides that in School Districts of the first class the Board must provide printed ballots for the election of Directors. It further provided that you have the names appearing on this ballot of candidates whose Certificates of Nomination have been signed by not less than 3 per cent, and must be at least 10 persons, of the number of qualified voters voting for school directors at the last annual election. These certificates of nomination must be filed with the Clerk at least seven days before the date of election. The parties so nominated must also file at least 5 days before the annual election, an acceptance of this nomination. This is especially interesting just now as the Annual School Election is to be held the 3rd Monday in June, being the 29th of the month this year. 68\*
