2 AGED CITIZENS STAGE BOUT OVER CONTESTED LAND

John Antle, age 76, and James Bowling, age 72, both hale and hearty, indulged in a flistic encounter Sunday, over the ownership of a lot on West Main street. The gray-haired batters were arrested by Chief of Police Timothy under the city ordinance "to punish and prevent riots, and disorderly conduct," and are specifically charged with "conducting themselves in a violent and disorderly manner, contrary to the peace and dignity of the county of Jackson, and the state of Oregon."

Bowling appeared before Justice Glenn O. Taylor this morning, pleaded guilty, and was fined \$19 and costs. Antle reserved his plea until 2 o'clock this afternoon. He is defended by Attorney Gus Newbury.

The youthful pair are neighbors, and Antle was cutting grass on the disputed land with a scythe, when Bowling appeared, and, according to the story ordered him off, and it is alleged he was armed with a club. Upon Antle's refusal to depart, Bowling declared, "I'll put you off." Antle dropped his scythe and prepared to defend his territorial integrity. Then the fracas started.

A vigorous encounter ensued, in which Bowling was pained on the nose with a snappy right, and Antle received a clout across the wrist with a fist stick with knots on it. Mrs. Bowling is said to have rushed to the assistance of her mate. Other neighbors rushed to the scene and separated the combatants. The damage was trivial.

During the rumpus somebody telephoned Antle's boy Dick, who went out and informed his pa that "only cats and dogs fight," and "little boys must be kind to each other." Harmony was restored without trouble, and the riot stifled faster than it started.

Antle holds a deed to the disputed property and his plea in court will be that he acted in self defense in defending his property.

MEXICO RESUMES DEBT PAYMENTS

MEXICO CITY, June 12.—Payment of interest on the Mexican foreign debt will be resumed on July 1 and the national budget expenditures will be increased 20,000,000 pesos for that purpose, it was stated last night by Emmanuel Padres, acting secretary of the treasury.

The interest on Mexico's foreign debt amounts approximately to four million pesos per year.

The money received from petroleum companies in payment of the new export taxes which go into effect July 1 will be deposited in the Banco Nacional de Mexico and will not be withdrawn except for the payment of interest on the debt of the country.

HENRY C. IDE, EX-PHILIPPINE GOVERNOR, DIES

ST. JOHNSBURG, Vt., June 12.—Henry C. Ide, formerly governor general of the Philippines and later minister to Spain under the Taft administration died at his home here today.

He recently had returned from California, where he spent the winter.

Mr. Ide, who was 76 years of age, was a native of Barnet, Vt., and first entered diplomatic service as United States commissioner to Samoa in 1891.

Later he became chief justice of Samoa, under a joint appointment of the United States, Great Britain and Germany, serving until 1897.

In 1901 he went to the Philippines as a member of the Taft commission to establish a civil government and became secretary of finance and justice, vice governor, acting governor and governor general. He was sent to Spain as minister in 1909 and remained until August, 1913. Two daughters, Mrs. W. Bourke Cockran of Washington, and Mrs. Shane Leslie of London, survive.

Ring Sketches of Bygone Years

Three years after Bob Fitzsimmons lost the heavyweight crown to James J. Jeffries, he tried to get it back and failed. Jeffries knocked him out in less time than on their first meeting.

The second encounter was at San Francisco July 25, 1902 and in the eighth round it ended in victory for the champion. Their first fight lasted eleven rounds.

The sport critics said Fitzsimmons outboxed Jeffries at every point. But Jeffries had about the same capacity for punishment as Garantua had for food, and besides, he had a tremendous advantage in weight.

Fitzsimmons fought a heroic fight and danced about the heavy-swinging Jeffries and sent home many a hard hitting fist. The force of these was impotent against the great bulk of the champion, however. In the moment Jeffries sent a hard left hand smash to the jaw and followed it up with another left to the stomach that knocked his lighter opponent to the floor. Fitzsimmons tried to rise, but sank down and was counted out.

ROTARY MEETING SCOTLAND, OPENED BY PORTLAND MAN

EDINBURGH, Scotland, June 12.—(By the Associated Press)—With the United States and Canada supplying 1500 of the 2500 delegates present, the annual convention of the International Association of Rotary clubs was opened this morning.

The proceedings began with a pageant in which standard bearers, each attended by four young girls in national costume, carried the flags of the 25 countries represented, while the national hymn of each country was played on the great organ in Usher hall, where the principal meetings will be held.

The address of welcome was delivered by the lord provost, who said there were great possibilities for the Rotarians to render assistance to the public at large and to improve international relations. Estes Suedecor of Portland, Ore., president of the international association, in opening the convention announced that the movement had nearly 70,000 members. By its international character, he said, it would serve the world, which was groping for an association of nations. The destinies and the peace of the world, he declared, were largely in the hands of its business men.
