POLO WAS PLAYED BEFORE COLUMBUS DISCOVERED AMER.

NEW YORK, June 16.—Although the international polo matches between the United States and English teams, which are restricted to England this week, began in 1886, the game of polo was played before Columbus discovered America.

The game was introduced in the United States in 1876, but the sport is centuries old. It originated in Persia and was played in China and India long before cavalry officers, garrisoned in India, brought the sport to England and made it the "sport of kings."

Largely because of the excellent training in horsemanship which polo affords, it has been fostered by government and army officials. At the close of the recent war, Sir Douglas Haig conferred upon the sport a "distinction," declaring it to be the most efficient training for army officers yet devised.

When James Gordon Bennett brought mallets, jerseys and balls to this country in 1876, he and several associates gave the game its first try-out at Dickols' Riding academy, then located at 29th street and Fifth avenue, New York.

JONES MERCANTILE ACT IS UPHELD

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, June 15.—(Delayed)—Application of the territory of Alaska and the Jensen Hardware company for a restraining order enjoining the collector of customs at Juneau from acting to forfeit merchandise shipped from a Canadian port in violation of the Jones mercantile marine act was denied in federal court here today.

Territorial Attorney General John Ruskard announced that the case would be appealed.

Minister Attacks 'Blue Law' Agitators; 'Sunday Is for Man Not Man for Sunday'

LOS ANGELES, June 16.—"It ought to be remembered by the 'blue law' advocates that they can't legislate righteousness. People cannot be made to be good, but they can be induced to be good. I maintain that it isn't so much what you do as what you don't do on Sunday that hurts you. The great American sin is the sin of omission. Sunday was made for man, not man for Sunday."

Thus believes the Reverend Father Neal Dodd, rector of the Church of St. Mary of the Angels, Episcopal, and known in the film studios as the "movie" rector. Father Dodd plans to have erected soon a new church in Hollywood, which will cater particularly to the spiritual needs of the fifteen to twenty thousand persons in "movie-land."

Father Dodd is widely known for his views on the censorship of motion pictures. He has taken the stand that the average individual "resents censorship as a repugnant manner of taking away his inherited rights." Further discussing his ideas, the Rev. Father Dodd said:

"The best way to kill objectionable pictures is to refuse to lend them support at the box office. It is un-American to have a board of censorship tell people what pictures they shall see and what they shall not see. Let the people judge for themselves. The producer of an offending picture will come in for a reckoning, not only now, but at a later day, if he presents something offensive to public opinion."

Father Dodd believes whatever agitation is back of the Sunday "blue laws" movement is part of a wave of hysterical reform which has been sweeping the country without thought of its results."

SIZE OF EARTH IS REDUCED A THOUSAND TIMES

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 15.—Our universe is a thousand times larger than has been believed, and the earth, far from being in the center of things, is 360 quadrillion miles from the center of the universe, according to discoveries discussed recently by Dr. Harlow Shapley, noted astronomer, who recently came to Harvard in California.

Dr. Shapley is a comparatively young astronomer, yet he has won a high place in his professional field. He is a graduate of the Missouri State university and of Princeton. He was identified with the Mount Wilson Observatory seven years.

By taking the distance between sun and earth as a base for triangulation measurements, vast distances in the past have been recorded until such times have been extended hundreds of light years and even to the border of measurement, the Pleiades.

Light travels at the rate of 186,000 miles a second, and a light year is the distance a ray of light will travel in one year.

The Pleiades are hardly in the front yard of Dr. Shapley's galaxy, which he has measured and found to be in length about 300,000 light years. It is a super-milky way.

A light year, the distance a beam of light will travel in one year, is 6,000,000,000,000 miles. It takes but eight minutes for light to come to the earth from the sun, 93,000,000 miles away.

Insignificance of the Earth. The young astronomer has proved by calculations that the sun—the little speck of light around which a tiny shadow called the earth revolves—is not by any means the center of the universe, but is 69,000 light years off the center. He has caused our present solar system to take a long sidereal sidestep into insignificance.

"Personally I am glad to see man sink into such physical nothingness," said the scientist, "and it is wholesome for human beings to realize of what small importance they are in comparison with the universe."

In fact, Dr. Shapley appeared enthusiastic over the fact that he has reduced the size of the earth a thousand times.

At the Mount Wilson Observatory Dr. Shapley spent a great deal of time studying globular clusters of stars, and principally one called "Messier 13," which is 35,000 light years from the earth. Small stars in this group are 100 times as large as our sun, while the larger and more brilliant he described as a thousand times as big as our sun.

AMERICANS MUST LEARN TO INVEST IN FOREIGN LANDS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—Restoration of American foreign trade depends upon extension of long term credits and increased buying abroad. W. F. H. Koelsch, president of the National Association of Credit Men, declared today in his annual report to the convention of the organization.

"It is high time," he said, "that we as a people began to realize that we cannot prosper alone. While it is true that the United States needs foreign trade more than at any time in its history, this trade will not be secured and held without great efforts on our part. At home, these efforts will have to be directed against measures devised by men who believe that American can be prosperous even if the rest of the world faces industrial stagnation."

"The restoration of our international commerce depends largely upon long credits, in my sincere judgment. These credits we are better able to extend than any other people. The reversal of our position from a debtor to a creditor nation brings obligations which we have not yet recognized but must if we are to be saved from muddling our opportunities and seriously affecting our return to prosperity."

"We must learn to invest in foreign lands. Trade will follow our investments. We must also learn to buy as well as sell. We must not expect to sell alone as a creditor nation, for there is no rule in business which would long permit that. We would simply continue to demoralize our opportunities and retard our production for foreign markets."
