LOCAL RED CROSS WILL GIVE AID TO STRICKEN PUEBLO

A nation wide appeal for immediate help to meet the urgent needs of more than 7,000 stricken citizens was made June 15 by flood wrecked Pueblo through the agency of the American Red Cross.

The American Red Cross has authorized all city and county chapters throughout the country to receive and forward contributions for Pueblo sufferers.

Upon invitation of the governor of Colorado and the city of Pueblo, the American Red Cross has undertaken the task of rehabilitation and is in charge of all relief work. Destitute families are now being taken care of in refugee camps and thousands are being fed daily at field kitchens maintained under Red Cross direction. Initial steps to rehabilitate those unfortunate persons have been started, so that they may again become productive citizens and not continue as objects of charity. Homes must be built and productivity restored, with the principle always adhered to of making each sufferer help himself as far as he is able. This will necessitate funds being made available immediately. The Red Cross has appropriated \$105,000 to the relief funds but general subscriptions reported to date have been light.

The national American Red Cross has already appropriated \$110,000 for relief purposes from the disaster fund, which is made up of the 50 per cent of all dollar memberships received. The local chapter A. R. C. will receive all donations and will forward same to headquarters as they come in.

'FILIPINOS NEARLY BANKRUPT'—WOOD

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The Philippine government is facing bankruptcy, Major General Leonard Wood and former Governor General Forbes declare in a cablegram transmitted today to congress by Secretary Weeks, who asked immediate action on a bill authorizing the island government to increase the limit of indebtedness from fifteen million dollars to thirty million dollars.

General Wood and Mr. Forbes, who are investigating conditions in the islands for President Harding, said the national bank with which the island government, provinces and municipalities are required to deposit all funds, was "practically insolvent."

MISS LEITCH WINS THE FRENCH CHAMPIONSHIP

FONTAINEBLEAU, France, June 17.—(By Associated Press.) Miss Cecil Leitch, British women's golf champion today defeated Miss Joyce Wethered, also of England, in the final of the French women's open golf championship tournament by 6 up and 5 to play.

This was the fourth time Miss Leitch won the French championship. Miss Alexa Stirling, of Atlanta, American woman's golf champion, who was a strong contender for the title this year, was eliminated by Miss Wethered in the semi-finals yesterday.

CURZON TAKES L. GEORGE PLACE FOREIGN AFFAIRS

PARIS, June 17.—Lord Curzon, British secretary for foreign affairs, arrived here today to confer with Premier Briand relative to problems possibly including reparations and Silesia, facing France and Great Britain. Great interest was taken in his visit to Paris, in view of recent reports that Prime Minister Lloyd George had decided to confine his attention to home politics, leaving foreign affairs to Lord Curzon.

POISON FOUND IN EXHUMED BODY OF DEAD HUSBAND

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, June 7.—Mrs. Lydia Southard, charged with the murder of Edward F. Meyer, her fourth husband, was today bound over for trial in the district court here at the conclusion of the second day of the preliminary examination in her case. W. P. Guthrie, chief counsel for the defense, stated that he would apply this afternoon to the district court for admission of Mrs. Southard to bail, and that failing in this, he would ask for immediate trial.

Action of the court came after a morning of testimony designed to strengthen the state's contention that Meyer's death was due to arsenic poisoning and to show the possibility of Mrs. Southard's connection therewith. E. R. Dooley, city chemist, on the stand said that he had made tests of samples of organs taken from the body of Meyer, which was exhumed April 2, 1921, almost seven months after his death and that he had found poison in all the specimens, including the hair. In all, the chemist said, he found one-fourth grain of the poison in the samples tested. He was certain, in his own opinion, that there was contained in the whole body more than enough poison to cause death.

MEXICO CITY, June 17.—Two persons were killed and four wounded during a fight between two soviet factions in the eastern part of the state of Michoacan yesterday. The clash was caused by a dispute between the factions over the ownership of a hill midway between the towns of Etzanaro and Villa Guadalupe. Soviet elements in the village of Chilichola, in the same state, attempted yesterday to take over municipal authority, but federal troops arrived in time to suppress the uprising.
