'BABE' RUTH IS FINALLY STOPPED BY DICKIE KERR

CHICAGO, June 18.—Babe Ruth and Wee Dickie Kerr, White Sox share the honors in the American league averages released today which include games of Wednesday for Babe broke all hitting records and Kerr stopped the mighty slugger when he seemed on an endless home run streak. Ruth shattered all records by driving out seven home runs in five games, one establishing a new mark for distance, its estimated length being 470 feet, and gathered enough shorthits to bring his average from .349 to .375. This placed him well to the front in the players who have been in thirty or more games. Then he faced Kerr and his home run streak was broken. Ruth had 23 homers up to Wednesday and was 16 days ahead of last season's mark. All the leaders of a week ago suffered slight hitting slumps, except Ruth. Harry Heilmann, of Detroit, lost nine points, but continued to hold the lead with a mark of .421, while Tris Speaker, pilot of the Cleveland world's champions, continued to be the runner-up with .414. Ty Cobb lost seven points and is third with .394. Sinner of St. Louis is leading the league with 14 stolen bases. Other leading hitters: Severid, St. Louis, .382; Williams, St. Louis, .375; Ruth, New York, .375. Austin McHenry, the slugger of the fielder of the St. Louis Cardinals, is making rapid strides toward the top among the National league hitters, and is pushing his teammate, Rogers Hornsby, for the lead. Hornsby suffered a slight slump and dropped from .424 a week ago to .416, which remains the lead.

CHINA ASKS THAT JAPAN LAY HER CARDS ON TABLE

PEKING, June 18.—There should be no equivocation about the terms under which Japan intends to restore Shantung to China, Dr. W. W. Yen, China's minister of foreign relations told the Associated Press today. "If Japan intends to restore the German leased territory in Shantung and the inalienable rights and privileges formerly enjoyed by Germany without conditions, Japan should announce that fact to the world in unequivocal terms," Dr. Yen said. "If she proposes to make conditions for such restitution she should likewise frankly announce those terms for all nations to pronounce judgment upon them. China does not want an empty restoration but wishes to know in advance what restoration is meant—what Japan proposed to do with all public buildings, docks, railway terminals, railroads, mines, the property seized by Japan since her occupation forced sale, salt industry and the revenues from the railways collected by Japan during her occupation. "Let Japan go on record as to what she intends to do with these and other questions and there will be no need for negotiations. The Chinese people regard with suspicion Japan's suggestion that China and Japan enter into negotiations regarding the Shantung question, realizing that in the past China always lost either territory or prestige as the result of negotiations over international controversies and they further believe that in this instance there is no occasion for negotiations."
