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THYE AND HAND TO WRESTLE IN ASHLAND JULY 4

Finish Match for \$1750 Purse and Oregon Championship Arranged As Big Feature of Ashland Celebration—Winner to Meet Miller.

ASHLAND, June 22.—(Special.) Ted Thye, for three years champion middleweight wrestler of the world, of Portland and Ralph Hand of Gold Hill, will wrestle in the Chautauque building in Ashland on July 4 for a purse of \$1750—divided \$1250 to the winner and \$500 to the loser.

In securing this feature the Jackson county parade and celebration managers made a hit that will probably bring more people to the event than anything else arranged for. These two men are so equally matched that this finish contest will attract general notice throughout the country, for the winner will unquestionably contest the middleweight championship of the world with Walter Miller of Los Angeles. Miller, present champion, won the title from Thye a short time ago.

These two men have met twice before. Thye came to Gold Hill three months ago and sold he would throw Hand twice in an hour, but failed to throw him once. Later, they were again matched, and after a three hours struggle neither secured a fall. As this contest on the Fourth is to go to a finish, two falls out of three, it will determine definitely who is the better man.

Ashland is mighty fortunate to secure this match between these two famous wrestlers for many cities have been trying to get them. Both men are fine physical specimens of manhood and the contest will be the cleanest kind of sport, at which many women and children will be seen. The wrestlers will be a striking example to the boys showing what clean living and systematic exercise will do for them.

The Jackson county parade and celebration grows bigger and bigger as time passes, and the securing of this great wrestling match will make the occasion perhaps as notable an event as ever took place in Ashland.

The blacksmith himself, greatly embarrassed, consulted with his wife over the best way to receive me. "Mr. Hohenzollern" didn't change his attitude a bit when he learned that I was a Frenchman and that I was a newspaperman. "So you are from Paris?" he said.
