PUBLIC OWNERSHIP STARTS HOT FIGHT A. F. L. CONVENTION

DENVER, June 22.—John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers and a candidate for the presidency of the federation, in an address on the convention floor today, declared for the "inherent right of labor and the public to regulate the affairs of industry in the interest of all the people."

Mr. Lewis spoke in support of a minority report of the resolution committee which declared for "public ownership and democratic co-operation of all industries organized under corporate grants or privileges," as well as the railroad systems.

Practically all the railroad organizations and the machinists union, as well as the mine workers rallied to the support of the minority report, which was opposed by Samuel Gompers.

HURRICANE MOVING ALONG GULF COAST

WASHINGTON, June 22.—The tropical storm raging on the gulf coast apparently was moving inland over the Texas coast in the vicinity of Matagorda Bay at noon today, said a special bulletin issued by the weather bureau here at 1:30 p. m.

HOUSTON, Texas, June 22.—Hurricane warnings were issued today by Dr. Bunneymeyer, director of the Houston weather bureau, immediately after receiving the following message from Observer Mitchell at Washington:

"Tropical hurricane warnings 9:30 a. m. Matagorda Bay to Port Arthur. Tropical storm central off Texas coast east of Corpus Christi. Apparently moving northward and increasing in intensity. It will be attended by dangerous shifting gales along the Texas coast between Corpus Christi and Port Arthur. Take all necessary precautions."

OREGON BONUS BILL IS NOW EFFECTIVE

SALEM, Ore., June 22.—The constitutional amendment adopted by the people at the special election June 7 providing for a soldiers, sailors and marines' loan and bonus fund and the amendment empowering the governor to veto the emergency clause on executive enactments, are now effective having been proclaimed by Governor Oicott late yesterday, following an official canvass of the complete vote from all counties.

One other proposed constitutional amendment—that to change the duration of the executive session from forty to sixty days—failed of adoption.

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Ring Sketches of Bygone Years

Some people think Jess Willard defeated Jack Johnson because he was the better fighter. Others feel sure that Johnson was beaten by his own good living and by the irresistible slow-motion process that time imposes on every man after he passes the crest of physical perfection.

Whatever the cause, the star of Jack Johnson's ring career flicked out at Havana on April 5, 1915. That day, for the second time in his life, Johnson was knocked out. The first enforced nap had mattered not. It was taken at Galveston in 1901 at the hands of Joe Choynski and Johnson was almost unknown beyond the island where he lived.

Willard was 27 years old, ten years the junior of the champion and both his height and reach exceeded those of Johnson. The heavy, the holder apparently put forth his best effort in the early rounds but he could not topple the giant to the canvas.

Later, the signs of leg weariness were apparent. In the champion's movements. In the 18th round he suddenly seemed to become exhausted, while the Kansan was still fresh and glowing.

Plainly tired and worn out, Johnson kept up the fight for seven more rounds. Leaving his corner at the going for the 26th round, he glanced at his wife with a look of distress and despair that warned those near the ring of his impending fall.

As soon as he met Willard, almost the cowboys right arm shot out and struck Johnson flush on the chin. He sank down and a new champion was proclaimed.

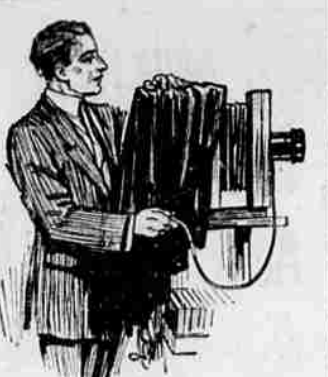

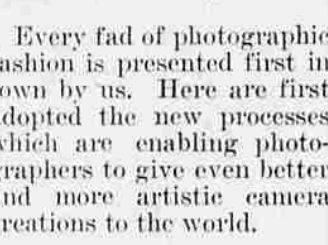

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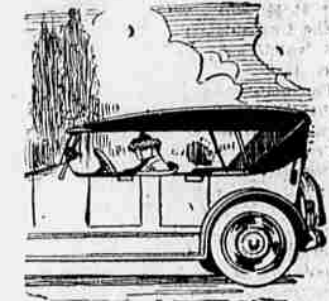
