

SCHOOL BOARD BUYS MEDFORD BASEBALL PARK

Announcement has just been made that the Medford school board, through its special committee, John C. Mann and Joseph O. Grey, has contracted for the purchase of the former Medford baseball park from Court Hill and Mrs. Chas. Young at a price of \$3700, on which a payment has been made, the balance to be paid for in two years' time.

In making this purchase for use as a public school athletic field and eventually to be the site of a new high school building when conditions become imperative for such a building, the board killed two birds with one stone. The grounds, three or four acres in extent, are located on Second street off North Holly st., and constituted the last available space of land close in which was suitable for an athletic park.

It is planned to use the funds contributed last spring to build bleachers at the Jackson school athletic ground, together with other contributions, which will be sought from the public, to fence in the grounds just purchased and erect a grand stand or bleachers before next fall, in time for the opening of the high school football season.

CORNELL JUNIOR VARSITY VICTORS FRESHMEN, ALSO

REGATTA COURSE, POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 22.—Cornell won the junior varsity two mile race by five lengths. The Ithaca second crew jumped into the lead at the start and was never headed. Syracuse held second place with Pennsylvania third and Columbia fourth until the final half mile where Pennsylvania spurred and shot past the Syracuse eight into second place.

Syracuse finished third, one and a half lengths ahead of Columbia.

REGATTA COURSE, HIGHLAND, N. Y., June 22.—They were off for the freshman eight oared race at 5:23 p.m. They were off to a pretty start, Cornell, however, seemed to have a slight advantage with Syracuse second and Pennsylvania and Columbia even.

Cornell won the freshman eight oared race. Syracuse was second, two lengths behind; Pennsylvania third, four lengths in the rear and two lengths of water separated the Pennsylvania and Columbia shells.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—Oregon's allotment for the protection of forest reserves from fire this summer will be \$25,000 according to an announcement received here today from the department of agriculture at Washington, D. C. The state of Washington will receive \$21,000 for the same purpose.

KING OPENS IRISH PARLIAMENT

presided at the state opening of the Ulster parliament here today. It was the first time in nearly twenty years that Ulster had entertained the British sovereigns and its welcome helped make the occasion memorable.

The ceremony held in the city hall was similar to that attending the inauguration of the British parliament at Westminster and was a brilliant spectacle. The hall was packed with those having cards of admission, but the distinguished assembly regarded the event as marking an important epoch in Irish history. Sinn Fein and nationalist members of the parliament did not participate in the exercises.

Victoria and Albert dropped her escort at the entrance to Belfast Lough to make her way up the straight channel to the dock, the king and the queen

were the objects of enthusiastic demonstrations by the loyalists of Ulster. Ship-Workmen Cheer
An even noisier welcome awaited the royal pair as their yacht steamed past the shipyards where the cheers

of thousands of workmen mingled with the shrieks of siren and whistle. King George and his consort stood on the bridge of the steamer and acknowledged the greeting.

As the monarchs set foot on the dock, the royal salute boomed out, announcing that they were on Irish soil. With the exception of the formal reception by Viscount Fitzalan, lord lieutenant of Ireland, and Lord Pirrie, who appeared in behalf of the city, there were no ceremonies at the dock. A squadron of police headed the procession and the carriages of the royal pair were followed by those of officers and dignitaries. The escort of honor was chosen from the Tenth Hussars.

Army on land
On each side of the street was stationed a force of nearly six thousand regular troops standing shoulder to shoulder and separated from the crowds by a heavy railing. In other parts of the city police kept vigilant guard against untoward incidents.

Arriving at the city hall the king and queen were met by the lord mayor and members of the Belfast council.

After the ceremonies the king and queen were entertained at luncheon by Sir James Craig, the premier of Ulster. Then they were driven once

more through the flag-decorated streets to Ulster hall, where they re-

ceived addresses of loyalty from various organizations.
