**386 BOYS AND GIRLS ENROLLED IN CLUB WORK**

Three hundred and eighty-six boys and girls are enrolled in club work this year, 500 of them being members of standard clubs.

Although it is rather early yet to estimate the result of the work, judging from the members enrolled and the interest shown by these boys and girls, this should be a banner year as far as club work is concerned.

Sewing seems to be the most popular project, with poultry, vegetable gardening and cooking coming in close behind.

The large enrollment in the poultry clubs is no doubt due to the generous offer of Postmaster W. J. Warner of Medford to give a setting of eggs from his purebred White Leghorns to any boy or girl in the county who would carry the project through, make an exhibit at the county fair, and give him one pullet from the setting in the fall. About twenty boys and girls in the county have taken advantage of this offer and are raising pure bred chickens.

Nine members are taking the call club work. These members own their own pure bred calves some of which are registered under the members' own names. The boys are all enthusiastic and Jackson county has reason to be proud of these young livestock owners.

The sheep club work is represented by one boy, Calvin Bushnell of Neil creek.

The "Merrymakers" sewing club of the Chapparral school has the distinction of being the first club in the county to finish its work and file final reports in the office of the state club leader at O. A. C. They held their achievement program April 15 at the Chapparral school house. Mrs. John Bigham is their local leader. The members of the club who finished their work are Naomi Magruder, Doni McDonough, Grace Bigham, Wenonah McKinnis, and Ruth Bigham.

Miss Helen Cowgill, assistant state leader, was in the county for a week during March visiting the sewing clubs and helping the girls with their work.

Mr. Allen, state livestock leader was here in May looking after the boys and girls interested in that line of work.

**WITHHOLD CURZON FOREIGN RELATION TALK FROM PRESS**

LONDON, June 23.—(Canadian Press)—The imperial conference did not hold a formal session today, having adjourned after Lord Curzon's speech yesterday until Friday. It is planned to discuss the Japanese alliance early next week.

Lord Curzon's speech was a comprehensive but highly confidential review of the British foreign policy. The conference agreed that the address should not be published.

Lord Curzon took the conference completely into his confidence and invited the delegates to interrogate him.

This invitation was freely acted upon, Premier Melban and the other premiers subjecting Lord Curzon to what practically amounted to a cross-examination. The foreign secretary, it is known, did not touch upon the Japanese alliance except in a general way and neither advocated that it be denounced or renewed. The deal at great length, however, with the diplomatic conversation which he recently held in Paris with Premier Briand and the general lines of British policy both in Europe and in the Pacific.

**FOREST SERVICE MAN GUILTY EMBEZZLING**

MISSOULA, Mont., June 23.—J. A. Urbanowicz, fiscal agent for district number one of the federal forest service, which includes Montana and northern Idaho, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of embezzlement when arraigned before a United States commissioner here today. His bond was fixed at \$50,000, which his friends are attempting to raise.

Evidence of alleged defalcations in Urbanowicz's accounts will be presented to a federal grand jury at Helena tomorrow, it was stated. Forest service officials today declared that a check of the records showed a shortage of at least \$100,000.

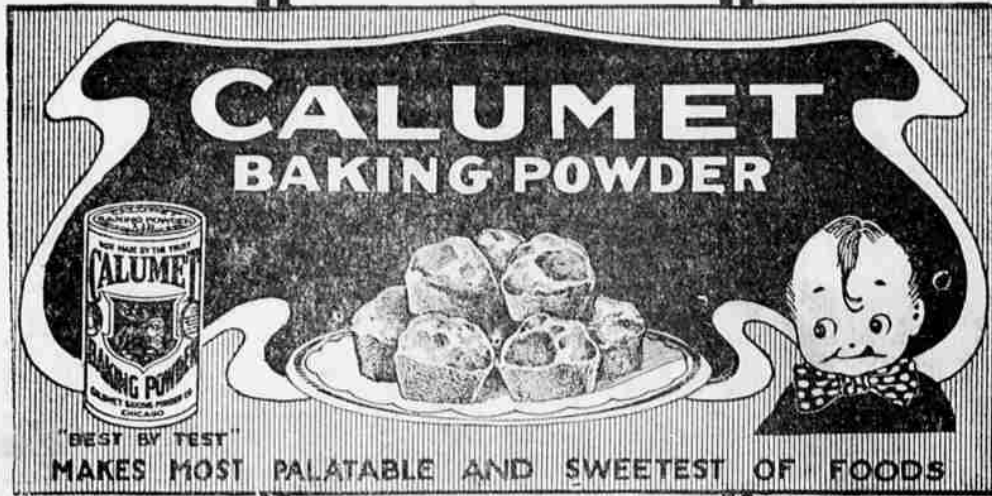
