ASHLAND, June 24.—Air stunts are to be added features of the big celebration on the Fourth. An expert from the noted aviation field at San Diego, Clyde Famborn, will introduce them. With air flights and wrestling bouts by professionals, celebration doings will attain phases even rivaling the excitement of oldtime roundup annals.

The oversight which the official chaparrone has over public dances will be supplemented by the city authorities due to enactment of a formal ordinance which will reinforce existing regulations. The phraseology of the enactment will not be ambiguous, inasmuch as specific forms of dancing will be "called right out in meetin'" and absolutely prohibited. The new ordinance will probably be in force early in July. By its provisions dance hall managers must see that rules are complied with, not leaving all supervision to the official "censor."

Portland has got another boost locally due to the circumstance that the city council will petition congress to have the historic battleship Oregon transferred from its present moorings at the Bremerton navy yard, Puget Sound, to Portland, for permanent service as recruiting and training headquarters in behalf of those who go down to the sea in ships.

### ASSOCIATED OIL GIVES OUT SECRET NEW LUBRICATION

As an indication of the public's attitude towards Cycol is a sale during the first few days that has exceeded all expectations. The production department of the Associated Oil company is now working night and day to take care of this created public demand. Cycol, within a period of a few days, the company claims, has become a name of large, state wide industrial significance.

### EARL FRUIT CO. IN BIG FRUIT MERGER

The Earl Fruit company, with a branch in this city, of which L. M. Campbell is manager, figures in an \$18,000,000 merger of the Di Giorgi interests. Ten California fruit firms and 29 other corporations in Oregon, Idaho and Washington are embraced in the new deal, and box factories and other appurtenances of the fruit business are included. The holdings of the new company extend into the southern states, and the islands of the Caribbean sea. The amalgamation will not affect the operations of the Earl Fruit company, which for some time has been under the control of Joseph Di Giorgi. The assets of the new merger are placed at \$9,000,000. Joseph Di Giorgi is president, Frank Harkness, treasurer, A. P. Overhouse, assistant treasurer, W. Farley, N. T. Cole and J. T. Trombetta, vice presidents, and Robert DeVecchi secretary.

### ACTRESS LEFT FORTUNE BY THEATRICAL MANAGER

Anne Mordock, noted actress, who was mentioned as the residuary legatee in the will of Alf Hayman, theatrical manager, which was filed in New York, Miss Mordock, for many years was a star in the Frohman productions, which Mr. Hayman managed. He died May 14. No mention is made of his widow, Mrs. Rose Hayman. The estate is estimated at \$1,000,000.
