INDIAN WINS IN GUN FIGHT FOR SACK OF HOCH. BELLINGHAM, Wash., June 25.—Jack Klett, said to be a half-breed Kikchit Indian, staged a gun battle with deputy sheriffs in Columbia valley, near the Canadian border, early yesterday afternoon. Walter Faggett, a bystander, was slightly wounded by one bullet and another cut through his coat sleeve. Klett, according to the officers, was taken by surprise just after he had crossed the boundary line with a sack of whiskey on his shoulder. He was arrested by two of the deputies but was not searched and as the trio were passing along a narrow trail, Klett got the drop on the deputies and disarmed them but finally returned their weapons after they had promised that they would not shoot him in the back and ordered them to go in opposite directions. Later he encountered two other deputies, who engaged him in battle from behind a stump. It is believed that Klett escaped without being injured.
