OREGON GROWERS' NEW ARRANGEMENT FULLY EXPLAINED

Since the announcement of the taking over of the Bardwell Fruit company by the Oregon Growers' Packing corporation, an erroneous impression has been created as to the contract between the growers' association and the Stewart Fruit company, its sales agent.

There is no plan or effort being made by the growers' association to force independent shippers into the organization. Any statement to this effect is absolutely without foundation. The plan of the growers' association is to eliminate the arrangement under which a very heavy percentage of the pears and apples grown in the Rogue River valley will be marketed through one sales agency.

If in making this arrangement we accomplish our purpose of eliminating a great deal of price slashing in Rogue River fruits, by selling agencies we will, in our opinion, have succeeded in correcting one of the great evils of the past marketing system.

Growers who are not members of the association can ship through the Stewart Fruit company exactly as they have done in the past. Indeed, we urge them to do so. In so doing, they do not obligate themselves in any way, either expressed or implied, to join the association at this or any other time.

The policy of the association will be to ship the fruit of independent growers through the Bardwell Fruit company warehouse and the fruit of its members through its own warehouses.

STUNT AVIATOR ASHLAND, JULY 4TH, A MARVEL

One of the sensational features of the Jackson county parade and celebration on the Fourth at Ashland will be the flying exhibition to be given by Aviator Clyde E. Pangborn, whose home is in San Diego. He will fly over the parade in the morning and throw flowers out of his plane upon the crowd below. In the afternoon he will do a number of stunts over the baseball field. Pangborn claims to do all the stunts that can be done on an aeroplane, including walking on the wings and hanging by the landing gear and says he has done more stunt flying than any other aviator in California.

Pangborn was first lieutenant in the U. S. Aviation Corps, and was an instructor during the war. He was the first man to fly from Texas to Idaho, where his mother lives. He has given many exhibitions up and down the Pacific coast. This year he has won three prizes in San Francisco.

He will carry passengers before and after the 4th and during the day, except when flying for the parade and celebration and says he expects to start a school both for straight flying and for stunts.

As the plans for the parade and celebration are being developed it is seen that the event will far surpass what was originally expected.

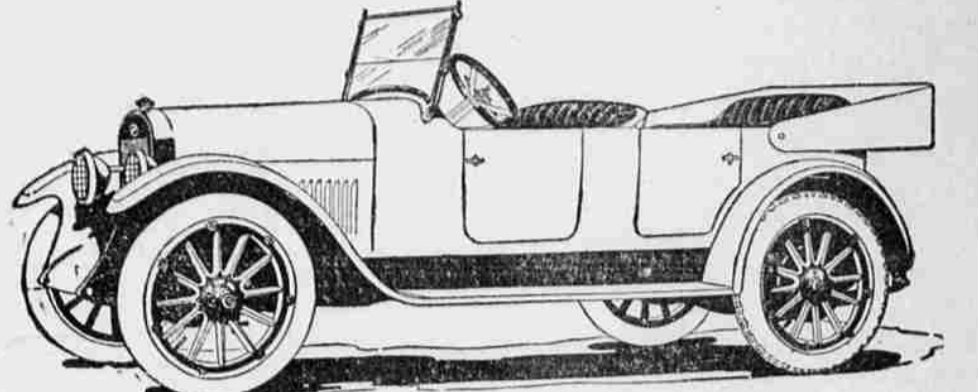

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MANY APPLICANTS FOR POSTMASTERS SOUTHERN OREGON

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Examination for postmasters in many parts of Oregon will be ordered within the next few weeks under the auspices of the United States civil service commission.

At the request of the postmaster general and in pursuance of an executive order signed by President Harding, May 19, 1921, all applicants for postoffices must undergo this examination at the place and on the date fixed by the civil service commission.

Under the order quoted the three candidates with the highest rating are certified to the postmaster-general and from these three he selects the successful applicant.

Blanks for applications to take the examination may be secured at all postoffices where vacancies occur on and after the announcement of the examination.

FIRE LOSSES IN JACKSON COUNTY ARE ANNOUNCED

The state fire marshal has made a report on the fires in Jackson county the last year. There were 99 fires, with insurance risks at \$392,359.70 and insurance losses paid amounted to \$64,667.30. The causes of the fires are listed: 32 to unknown causes, 10 to overheated stoves, chimneys, and boilers, 15 to exposure, 8 to careless smokers, one incendiary, and 12 to open fires, ashes, and petroleum or its products. Of the structures afire 50 were dwellings, and the remainder were stores or buildings used for mercantile purposes.
