ANOTHER STRIKE FAILS.

THE end of the British coal strike puts another nail in the coffin of the labor walk-out. Over a million men have been idle for three months, the coal industry in England has been dealt a blow from which it can not recover in years, the total cost to the people runs into the hundreds of millions and yet the men, according to press reports, return on practically the same basis, that they entered the conflict. The result is a disastrous defeat for British labor. While the government allows a generous subsidy, this was offered two months ago and refused because at that time, a labor government in England, control of industry by the workers, and a wage pool for the miners were all in contemplation. The first rift in the lute was the defection of railroad and dock workers,—the inability of organized labor to hold together. The miners refused to read the writing on the wall, however, and continued their hopeless struggle. Now they give in, with nothing gained, and for the time at least, everything lost. No one questions that the miners had a grievance, that reforms were needed and must ultimately be instituted, but as one views the ruin left in the wake of this strike, the question which society must answer is "Does it pay? Can it pay?" Hasn't the time come when modern civilization if it is to endure must eliminate not only war between nations, but war between classes within a nation. Labor gained nothing in this coal strike that couldn't have been gained by a "talk around a table," and the people of England will be paying the cost for another decade. A few more such experiences and England will outlaw strikes in vital public industries, as Kansas has done.

JACKSONVILLE GETS PLACE OF HONOR IN PARADE JULY 4

ASHLAND, June 28.—(Special) A meeting of the various committees on the Jacksonville parade and celebration at Ashland on July 4 was held last night at the Hotel Austin. Mrs. Loomis, chairman of the ways and means committee made an interesting report of her visit to various communities in the county. She was cordially received everywhere, and found that the interest in the event was general throughout the county. The biggest feature of the meeting was the action taken in the matter of precedence in the parade, Jacksonville being the oldest city in the county was given the honor of leading the parade, while Ashland to show her liberal spirit and broadmindedness voluntarily took last place. Miss Britt, the sister of the mayor of Jacksonville, was chosen to take the part of the Goddess of Liberty in the D. A. R. float which will head the march. Medford is to be second, followed by Phoenix, Talent, Central Point, Eagle Point, Gold Hill and Rogue River in the order named. The fact that Ashland unanimously voted herself into last position is an evidence that the old rivalry which was said to exist between her and Medford is gone and forgotten. It developed at the meeting that some big surprises are in store from several cities in Jackson county which will have places in the parade. Much mystery surrounds the features they will contribute, and from the careful manner in which details are being concealed from the public, it seems that competition for the cash prizes is going to be very keen. Mr. Shael of Talent is going to bring a number of cowboys who will take part in the parade. It was decided to have the parade start at 10 o'clock. Each feature in the parade will hear a number to enable the judges to make their decisions and award the prizes without confusion. The judges' stand will be on the balcony of the Hotel Austin. The parade will start on the boulevard at the library and proceed to East Main street to the Plaza, thence on North Main street to Mechanic, thence eastward on Mechanic to Heiman, thence south on Heiman to its intersection with North Main street where it will disband. The wrestling match will take place at 2 o'clock. Tickets are now on sale in Ashland at Rose Brothers and Irwin's cigar store; Brown & Brown, Medford; Ross & Ross, Central Point; Brokers Drug store, Gold Hill. The ball game will start at 4 o'clock, and the flying machine stunts will occur over the grounds during the game. Flowers will be thrown from the air plane upon the parade while it is moving through the streets. Between 1 and 2 o'clock free-for-all sprints will be held in the park, and cash prizes given to the winners. From 2:30 to 3:30 and 7 to 8:30 the band will give a concert in Lithia park, and at 9 o'clock the big fireworks display will take place. Dancing will wind up the most spectacular event that ever took place in Ashland. An official program will be distributed free to everybody on the morning of the parade. It will be a large four-page publication and will contain no advertising. In tomorrow's papers Marshall Homes will endeavor to give a detailed program of the line of march and fuller particulars about the parade. Those who are managing the parade and celebration express the opinion that the crowd which will come to Ashland on the Fourth will be very large—perhaps the greatest ever assembled in Jackson county.

STANDARD OIL TO INSTALL GASOLINE SERVICE TO LAKE.

The Standard Oil company today started their service to Crater Lake, which completes the service rendered by this company to the chain of all national parks in the United States. This service will be taken care of by one of the new 25-ton tank trucks equipped with 125 pneumatic cord tires and is the last word in motor equipment for such service. In the party leaving for Crater Lake today on the initial trip were Mr. W. A. Lavender, one of the company's representatives from San Francisco; Mr. R. H. Beck, superintendent of motor repairs for the Portland district who has personal supervision of over three hundred pieces of motor equipment; and Mr. W. E. Walker, special agent in the Medford field. Mr. H. B. Fairchild, east district sales manager from Portland will arrive later in the day to make the trip. This service is being installed by the Standard Oil company at a great expense and with little return in sight at the present time but they have great faith in the future of Crater Lake and want to render this service with the viewpoint of helping make this world wonder scenic attraction one of the show places of the Pacific coast and by giving this service it will enable motorists to have their wants in both gasoline and oils properly taken care of at the lake. The Standard Oil company, in the past two months, has been advertising Crater Lake in 256 daily newspapers on the Pacific coast as well as in several magazines and in their own Bulletin at a cost of approximately \$51,000.00. They have faith in the future of Crater Lake and southern Oregon. Four years ago there were only four employees of the Standard Oil company in Medford. With the growth of the company's business in the valley and with this latest addition to the service the number on the payroll in Medford is eighteen.

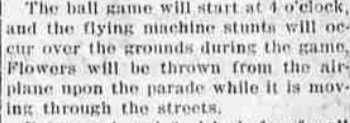
