HONEST TAX PAYERS.

HE director of the New York State Income Tax bureau reports that in auditing 745,000 returns for last year it was found that 36,000 people had not paid as much as they should, and they were assessed additional amounts accordingly. At the same time it was found that 22,000 had paid too much, and they were given refund checks. The director is convinced that in many other cases the taxpayers paid too much, but the facts were not clear enough to warrant a refund.

Other officials connected with the state and federal income tax departments agree that in paying these unpopular taxes, the public shows a much higher degree of honesty than evinces are accustomed to give it credit for. The plain fact appears to be, as shown by this and many other tests, that the average person is not naturally dishonest, but naturally honest.
