

### U. S. EXCLUDED FROM ACTIVITY HOLLAND OIL

THE HAGUE, July 1.—(By Associated Press.) The first chamber of parliament today, by a vote of 27 to 18, adopted the Diamid oil bill providing for exploitation of the valuable oil fields for a period of forty years by a combination of the Dutch Indian government and the Batavia Oil company, the latter belonging to the Shell group. The measure was adopted by the second chamber April 29.

Under the bill the combination exploiting the oil fields will be capitalized at ten million gilders. The capital will be divided equally but the company will be under control of the Dutch government and the board of directors must all be Dutchmen. The president, vice president and one other member of the board of directors will be nominated by the Dutch minister of the colonies. By adoption of the bill American interests are excluded from exploitations in the Diamid fields.

### CALL GRAND JURY SPECIAL SESSION

A special session of the grand jury was called this afternoon to convene next Wednesday, July 6th, with J. W. Eklund of Central Point as foreman, to continue, it is said, further investigation into the bank of Jacksonville failure. The grand jury was not dismissed at the May term of court, but was empowered to continue its investigation into the bank failure whenever convenient up to the calling of the October term of court.

### BETHLEHEM STEEL REDUCES WAGES

HARRISBURG, Pa., July 1.—A wage reduction of fifteen per cent by the Bethlehem Steel corporation, effective July 15, was made known to representatives of the employees at the Steelton plant today.

The reduction will affect all employees except salaried men whose reduction will amount to ten percent, effective August 1.

Company houses will be reduced in rental from eight to ten per cent.

### ANGLO-JAP TREATY TO CONTINUE YEAR

LONDON, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Anglo-Japanese treaty, Reuter's News Agency today says it understands, will automatically continue in force another year. Such continuation arises from acceptance of the cutting of Lord Bickenhead, lord high chancellor, that, falling formal denunciation the treaty automatically continues, Reuters adds.

### JUDGE REFUSES TO FREE MRS. CORBIN

SPOKANE, July 1.—Superior Judge Blake today denied a motion by Prosecuting Attorney Meyer for dismissal of a charge of first degree arson against Mrs. D. C. Corbin in connection with the alleged attempted destruction of the home here by fire last April.

### DEAF MUTES GATHER AT SALEM MEETING

SALEM, Ore., July 1.—Deaf mutes of Oregon are gathering here today for the conference tomorrow at the Oregon state school for the deaf mutes when the Oregon State Association for the Deaf will be formed. The constitution for the new association has been drawn up and is ready for adoption.

The aim of the association is to unite the common interests and promote the general welfare of the deaf. Most of the delegates to the convention are graduates of the state school. The conference will end with a picnic Monday.

### FILIPINO POLICE GUILTY, MURDER

MANILA, P. I., July 1.—Seventy-seven members of the Philippine constabulary were convicted today of murder for the killing of three American members of the Manila police force and eight other persons in rioting between the constabulary and police force last December 15.

Three sergeants and eight corporals were sentenced to life imprisonment by Judge Carlos A. Imperial of the Philippine court of first instance. The sixty-six privates received sentences of 11 years, four months and one day.

There is no jury system in the Philippines and the judge heard the case and fixed the sentences.

All the defendants are already serving sentences of 10 years, having been convicted last February of sedition in connection with the riots.

### FRANCE FAVORS A GERMAN ALLIANCE

RIGA, June 30.—A bolshevik journalist who interviewed United States Senator Joseph I. France of Maryland, now on his way to soviet Russia, for Moscow and Riga newspapers quotes Senator France as having declared that American and Russian co-operation would suffice to counteract Japanese designs in Siberia and as advocating close cooperation between Russia, Germany and the United States in economic and political spheres.

Senator France told the Associated Press that in the main the interview was correct but that he did not eman to advocate a German, American and Russian political alliance.
