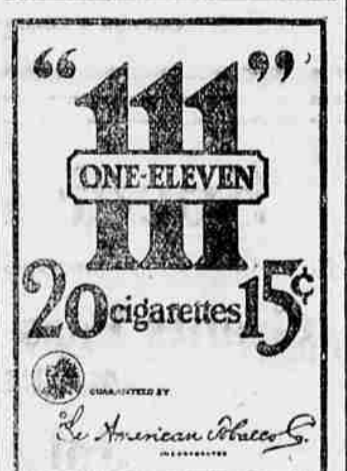

June was a normal month according to the regular report of the local weather bureau, with a maximum temperature of 95.6, a minimum temperature of 49.5, and a precipitation of .19. The precipitation last year for June was 1.81, but the three years preceding there was in 1920, a trace, 1919, .61 and 1918, .96.

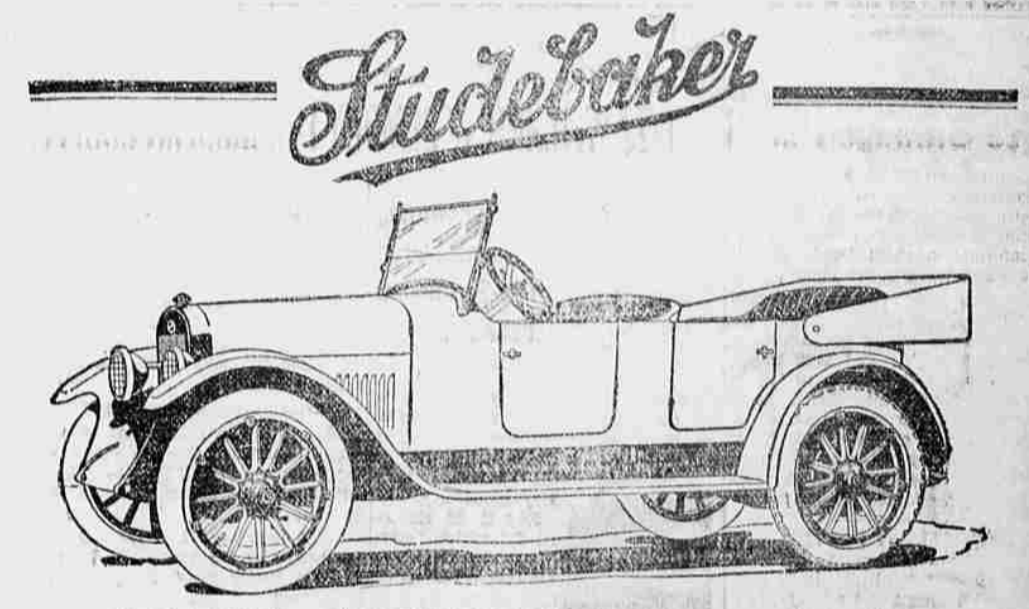
