WASHINGTON, July 5.—Shige Suyehiro, professor of law in Kioto imperial university, Japan, who is in this country in the interests of limitation of armaments, announced today that he had conferred on the subject with Senators Borah, republican, Idaho, author of the disarmament resolution, appended to the naval appropriation bill, and Keayon, republican, Iowa.

Professor Suyehiro declared that in his judgment it would be a "grave error" should the proposed disarmament conference be secret "because of the vital interest taken in the subject by British and Japanese people as well as those of the United States. If the impressions I have received here are correct.

"I suggested by feeling on this subject to both Senators Borah and Keayon," he added, "and felt greatly encouraged by their apparent attitude."

Professor Suyehiro said the movement for limitation of armaments had the backing of the political and active Japanese business interests.

Independent approval had been assured in Japan upon the many occasions that he had addressed them.

The citation says that Sergeant O'Neill, in advance of an assaulting line, attacking a detachment of about 25 of the enemy and though wounded many times remained in command of his men. He finally was forced by weakness and loss of blood to be evacuated but he insisted upon first being taken into the battalion commander to transmit valuable information relative to enemy positions and the disposition of the American forces.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Richard W. O'Neill of New York City, who served as a sergeant in Company D, 15th Infantry, has been awarded the congressional medal of honor for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty in action with the enemy on the Ourcq river, France, July 30, 1918. It was announced today at the war department.

SHERIFF KILLS NEGRO IN VICKSBURG COURT

VICKSBURG, Miss., July 5.—George Deal, negro, under indictment for killing a preacher, was shot to death in the court room here last night by Sheriff D. H. Shannon, when Deal tried to wrest a revolver from the hands of a deputy. Court was in session and the judge had postponed decision in Deal's trial when the negro arose and snatched a deputy's gun from a table, the deputy grappled with him and Shannon seeing that the lives of those nearby were in danger, fired three shots into the negro's back, the third killing him.

BODIES FIRST THREE U. S. HEROES ARRIVE

HOBOKEN, N. J., July 5.—Bodies of the first three American soldiers to fall on the field of battle in the late war will be sent with 7,300 others to their native cities next Sunday after a military funeral service at the army piers here.

The bodies of Private Thomas F. Enright of Pittsburg and Merle D. Day of Ghiddeh, Iowa, arrived with 5,822 other men the United States army transport Wheaton last Saturday. That of Corporal James D. Gresham of Evansville, Ind., was among 2,478 arriving on the transport Somme today. All three fell on the night of November 3, 1917. They were members of the sixteenth infantry, first division.

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JAP PROFESSOR FINDS SUPPORT FOR DISARMAMENT

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
